Messrs. German, Squibb, Stone, Flan-  
der, Chaffey, Smith, Sedore, Jno. Rose,  
Coady, Boyce, Jensen, Hearn, Camp,  
Porter, and Geo. Rose. Fishermen,  
and merchant rose to the occasion,  
and the different competitions were  
largely contested, and were lively and  
exciting struggles.

The committee in charge consisted

Stone, Secretary ably assisted by  
Magistrate Parsons, Customs' Col-  
lector German, Constable Squibb, and  
Mr. Thomas Flander. Everything went

Old Wharf and within this roped en-  
closure, the committee assisted by

Quann.

At night dancing competitions were  
held in the Parish Hall, making it a  
fitting climax to a great day. Many  
aspired to the honor of obtaining the  
Championship Belt for Fortune Bay  
District, and the Judges had their  
hands full in making their decisions.  
First honors, and championship ladies'  
step dancing went to Mrs. Susan  
Sheppard of Miller's Passage, a lady  
78 years old, who had walked twelve  
miles to be in at the finish. First  
prize, and championship for men  
went to Richard Hearn, 52 years old,  
and with a stature of over six feet.  
Altogether it was a great day, the  
greatest day ever, and all are so en-  
thusiased over it, that they intend to  
make it an annual event, with a 1923

**NEW SERUM CURE.**

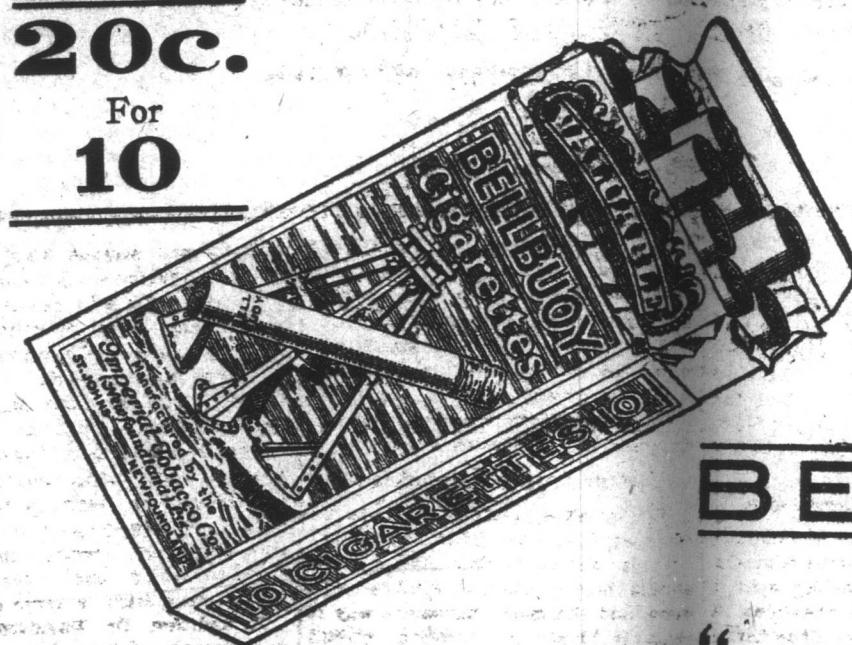
PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 13.
