Household Notes.

The acid fruit drinks are especially suited to the summer diet as they are a means of introducing more cleansing water into the system and are rich in liver stimulating and blood cleansing acids.
Boil an eggplant for fifteen minutes, remove a slice from the top, and the pulp; add to the pulp one and one-half cupsful of seasoned bread crumbs and to tablespoons of melted fat; refill the shell and bake.

Cook one cupful of rice in boiling, salted water for ten minutes, drain, and one pint of scalded milk and one cupful of seeded raisins, cover, cook until the milk is absorbed and serve with cinnamon and sauce.
Canned fish such as salmon or tuna are better if scalded before using, while canned vegetables such as spinach, peas or asparagus should be drained, and the liquor used in the dressing, or as a foundation for soup.
