The manifesto of the Hon. A. E. Hickman, which appeared in yesterday's issue of the Advocate, is a remarkable illustration of the truth of the proverb that 'in the multitude of words there wanteth not sin." Promises of reform and virtuous expressions of a desire for clean government and investigations into the recent scandals are unlikely to inspire confidence when they are ST. JOHN'S WEST: made by the men who were to a great extent responsible for the shame and disgrace which covers us to day.

Promises, Promises! Most of them misleading, others impossible of accomplishment, and all of them stamped with the unmistakable mark of the professional vote catcher. They are clothed in honeyed words, but are expressed in terms which would baffle the skill of the most astute lawyer to interpret. This great wave of verbosity rushes on, gathering volume as it goes, only to be flung back in froth and bubbles as it expends its strength in trying to beat down the solid wall of common sense possessed by the People of this Country.

A bonus on fish is promised, but the wording is such that while the tempting fruit is dangled over the fisherman's head, the chances of his grasping it are made utterly impossible.

A minimum wage is glibly spoken about, but is not the leader of the unnatural coalition aware that his own colleagues made the Humber agreement, and conveniently forgot to include in it a condition that none but Newfoundlanders should be employed on the work if they were qualified and were available? What is the result to-day? We are told of Canadians and Newfoundlanders who are employed on the same work at different rates of pay. Whose fault is that?

Next is a Labor Board, but we are under the impression that several of the members of this very party were drawing and it is said are drawing to-day, fat salaries as Labour Commissioners. For what? And are the duties of these new officials to be equally onerous? Elsewhere in the depths of this document is mentioned Retrenchment! Is this a sample?

For lack of consideration, sheer impertinence and crass ignorance the following sentence is worthy of note: "A Bill is to be presented to the Legislature to afford a measure of taxation relief to the COMMON PEOPLE!" We question whether any leader outside of Russia, since the days of the Feudal Barons, ever referred in such a manner to the free and independent voters of a country. Who are the people referred to in such slighting terms, and who, may we ask, are the aristocratic overlords?
