

several classes with some very choice specimens of fruit.

FLOWERS.
The show in this department is of the most extensive and varied description; indeed the accommodation devoted to this section is altogether too limited to admit of that proper display of the plants and flowers so essential to the convenient judgment of the judges, and a proper appreciation on the part of the public. Large numbers of people love to congregate around this portion of the Exhibition, and, ever and anon, return to feast their senses with renewed delight.

We regret that the very limited space at our command only permits us to give but a brief and cursory description. Our local exhibitors maintain their reputation as at previous shows. Mesdames Hogg, Munton, L. Parkinson, Jane Tolton, W. M. Mann, Joseph Parkinson, and Sorby upholding the lady's rights by some of the very choicest specimens of floriculture; whilst on the part of the gentlemen, we observe that Messrs. D. Allan, Geo. Elliott, A. A. Baker, N. Sunley, Ed. Burge, have done valiantly. Stook H. Kay, Waterdown, are very extensive exhibitors in this department, and have contributed very largely to the interest and success of this section. D. Caldwell, Galt, and James Shaw, Waterloo, worthily represent their district with a choice display of a variety of fine flowers and cut plants. E. H. Stock, of Brantford, also exhibits several articles of undoubted merit, no likewise do A. W. Slater, and James Sudden, of Galt. T. & J. Mauderson, Guelph, are exhibitors of a hand bouquet of open air flowers which look neat and tasteful. Wm. Sanderson, Brantford, takes the second prize for a fine collection of Gladioli. A. A. Baker being first. In floral ornaments, Mrs. W. M. Mann carries off the first prize, Wm. Stevenson, second, Mrs. Joseph Parkinson, third. We notice with pleasure the taste and skill displayed in the construction of these floral designs, especially the first prize one. We consider the floral ornaments of this year infinitely preferable in tasteful arrangement to those of last year.

CATTLE.
Thos. Guy, Oshawa, shows 13 head of Ayrshires, among which is an imported bull. Thos. Card, Guelph, a yoke of steers, Jas. Cowan, Waterloo, Durham bull. Messrs. Jardine, Saltfleet, a herd of 9 Ayrshires—6 of them imported—among which is a four year old bull, "Wilson," which took a first prize and diploma here last year; and a second at the Provincial last year; also a cow 4 years old, imported, which took a first prize at Hamilton and Guelph last year, and was never beaten in Scotland. The herd is very superior. Arch Park, West Oxford, is also a large exhibitor of Ayrshires. Geo. G. May, Bowmanville, shows a fine herd of Devons.

SHEEP.
Fred W. Stone, Guelph, exhibits 20 Southdowns, 7 rams, 13 ewes; 17 Cotswolds, 5 rams, 12 ewes and two pair fat ewes. Mr. Stone has taken 7 first prizes for sheep, 5 second, 6 third, and 2 fourth prizes; his sheep especially the Southdowns are fine.

George Hood, Guelph, exhibits 4 fine fat sheep, 2 weathers, and 2 ewes. He takes first prizes in both classes. Also, two fat weathers for which he takes a second.

James Anderson, Puslinch, shows five ewe lambs of the Southdown breed; also five Shearling ewes.

J. C. Douglas, Dumfries, shows some Southdowns, for which he takes first, second, and third prizes.

John Seall & Sons, Edmonston, show six pens of fine Cotswolds; they take the first prize for the best herd of Cotswolds. This is the third year they have taken this prize; this herd consists of two year old rams, both imported; one imported shearling ram, 6 imported ewes, 6 ewe lambs and 8 ram lambs, of their own breeding; this is really a fine breed. The ewe lambs are considered the best that has ever been shown in the Province. The 6 ewe lambs are sold for \$350, and go to Kentucky, U.S.

T. L. Easton, Nassagaweya, shows five Lincoln sheep.

J. R. Craig, Brampton, shows several pens of fine Cotswold sheep.

J. & A. Evans, Puslinch, 2 pens of Cotswold sheep.

There were several pens of fine sheep which we were unable to get the names of the owners, as they did not nail up their tickets.

PIGS.
Adam M. Oliver, Dumfries, shows a very fine 7 months old boar, of the Suffolk breed. This is a very good pig for that age.

John Merrill, Peel, shows a fine Suffolk sow and six fine suckling pigs about six weeks old.

Walter Laing, Nassagaweya, exhibits a fine boar, aged, a sow and one pair of fine pigs, Yorkshires.

A. Frank & Sons, Caledon, exhibit a fine Suffolk boar; also sow and five fine spring pigs.

Thos. Easton, Knatchbull, shows a large breed boar and two spring pigs.

Jno Hunt, Nassagaweya, shows a pair of spring pigs and improved Berkshire boar, under one year. Walter West, Guelph, shows three Suffolk sows and two Suffolk boars, breeding sow, Berkshire sow, under one year. John Card, Guelph, Suffolk boar, under one year. W. Wright, Ermaosa, shows a fine Berkshire boar. John R. Craig, Edmonston, shows 16 Berkshires, and he has some fine aged sows; also a fine aged boar, the young pigs are also good. John Bunyan, Guelph, shows a Berkshire boar, under one year. John Hewer, Guelph, exhibits several pens of the improved Berkshire breed. A boar, under one year, and a pair of sows, (Galt and Puslinch), improved Berkshire sow and a boar pig, James Cowan, Guelph, shows a fine pair of young pigs, Berkshires. W. A. Bookless, Guelph, shows his fine Berkshire boar, John A. B. D. Parker, Guelph, shows a Berkshire boar, under one year. A. M. Slater, Galt, shows fine Berkshire pigs. Allen Simpson, Guelph, shows an improved Berkshire boar. Alex. Gow, Guelph, shows a Berkshire breed sow and six fine pigs, one month old. Thos. McCrae, Guelph, shows several fine pens of Essex pigs—consisting of boars, sows, and suckling pigs. Isaac I. Johnston, Guelph, shows a Berkshire boar. R. Matthews, Guelph, shows improved Berkshire pigs, under one year. Daniel Allen, Guelph, shows a Berkshire sow and boar, under one year. He takes a third for his boar. James Anderson, Puslinch, shows an improved Berkshire boar and Essex boar—both good. Also fine breeding sow, Essex. R. McKersie, Guelph, shows a fine Berkshire breeding sow. Patrick McGarr, Guelph, shows a fine breeding sow, Berkshire.

TELEGRAMS.
Dundee, Scotland, Sept. 18.—The whaling steamer Arctic has arrived at this port, having on board the remainder of the crew Polar, who were picked up on the 20th of July by the whaler Ravenscrag from Dundee, 30 miles south of Cape York in boats constructed from remnants of bulwarks of the Polar. By the direction of the chief officer of the Ravenscrag the rescued crew were transferred to the Arctic.

New York, Sept. 18.—A Washington despatch says it was stated that the Treasury Department had, yesterday, passed to the London firm of Jay Cooke & Co., a warrant for one million dollars to pay naval officers abroad; but that the department has been advised that the warrant will be returned. Leading bankers express the opinion that the suspension of Jay Cooke & Co will not materially affect business interests here.
