The latest army regulations make
it plain that soldiers absent without
leave may be treated the same as
deserters, the penalty of two years'
imprisonment being the same for both
offences. Formerly a soldier had to
be absent 21 days without leave be-
fore he could be charged with deser-
tion, which gave much trouble. The
regulations also state that anyone
may, upon reasonable suspicions,
cause the arrest of a suspected de-
serter. Soldiers found out of bounds
without passes will also be liable to
the charge.

Eastman Kodaks at Caughell's.

Rev. Dr. Stewart Timpany, return-
ing medical missionary from India, de-
livered a strong address to a large
congregation at the Aylmer Baptist
Church last Sunday evening. He gave
much interesting information about
the country and its people, and
strongly emphasized the importance
of continuing the missionary work
among the millions of natives. Only
one in ten men of that country is
able to even sign his name in the
native language, and only one woman
in every one hundred and fifty. Dr.
Timpany told of the advantages a
missionary doctor had over others in
gaining admission to the homes of
these ignorant and superstitious
people, and taking advantage of the
opportunity thus afforded to intro-
duce the true Gospel. It is now 23
years since Dr. and Mrs. Timpany
first entered the work in India, and
the present is the second thorough
this worthy couple has had in all
that time. Their hearts are fully in
the work, and both are anxious to
start the return journey in about a
fortnight. During the service, excel-
lent solos were rendered by Mr. Will
Starr and Pastor Mitchell.

LIEUT. COL. W. J. BROWN,

of Aylmer, who has been appointed
A.A.G. of Camp and Military District
No. 1, succeeding Lieut. Col. W. A.
McCrinnon, O. and I.C.C., and
Major Gordon Ingram, D.A.G., of
Camp, temporarily appointed A.A.G.
of Camp a few weeks ago. Lieut.
Col. Brown has taken over the duties
of his new appointment. Colonel
Brown's headquarters will be at Lon-
don, Ont., and this appointment of
Assistant Adjutant-General is a per-
manent one.

The Colonel's many friends here
will be delighted to learn that his
duties now will bring him so close
to Aylmer. Col. Brown commanded
the 4th Canadian Artillery Brigade in
France previous to leaving the Front
to return to Canada on 15th July.

Lieut. Col. Brown is enthusiastic
over conditions at the Front. "The
Canadian artillery is at least as good
as that of the British," he stated,
"which is saying a lot for our men.
Conditions have improved immensely
since the 1st Division of Canadians
reached the firing line in September,
1915. At that time the Germans held
an unquestioned superiority in num-
bers of men and guns their trench
mortars were new and effective, their
superiority in numbers of machine
guns was very marked in fact, they
were superior in almost every branch.
To-day conditions are completely re-
versed. We are superior in every
particular. We have the guns of all
calibres, great quantities of ammu-
nition, our trench mortars are greatly
superior to theirs, our numbers of
trained men have increased, and we
practically have command of the air.
Their observation balloons are easily
wrecked by a new and ingenious de-
vice, a dart trailing an incendiary
bomb which is dropped on the sta-
tionary balloon from the clouds. This
removes an always threatening dan-
ger and permits of much more effi-
cient work on the part of our ar-
tillery."

"I must say that while conditions
are satisfactory in the extreme, the
Germans are by no means beaten and
more men, more guns, more and im-
proved equipment is still necessary
to the final winning of the war."
