A BICYCLIST BEHEADED.

Prof. Euvard Run Over by a Railway

Train in Massachusetts.

Detroit, Aug. 22.—Prof. Eugene J. Euvard, a teacher of languages in the Detroit Seminary, was run over and beheaded by a train yesterday while riding a bicycle on the railroad tracks between Blackinton and Williamstown, Mass.

The deceased came to Detroit four years ago, and taught in the Albrecht Gresham school, at Port and Wayne streets, for a time. Then he went to the Detroit Seminary. He was spending his vacation in the east, visiting relatives, when killed. The only relation he had in Detroit was an uncle, James J. Goux, of 1061 Warren avenue. He was an intimate friend of the Renauds, of Renaud's Hotel, and boarded there for several years.

THE DUTTON FIRE.

Dutton, Aug. 22.—On the night of

Nov. 7, 1895, the general stores of

U. R. Bros. were destroyed by fire. An

ing, but were subsequently dis-

charged. There was an insurance of

\$5,000 on the building and contents,

but no settlement was ever reached
