



A SESSION OF THE A.O.U.W. EXECUTIVE.

Proposal to Revise the Assessment Rates-Grand Recorder's Report.

Hamilton, Ont., Feb. 19.-The executive of the Ancient Order of United Workmen have been in session here since yesterday. There are fewer amendments to the constitution to come before the convention than usual, although there is likely to be considerable discussion on a proposal to revise the assessment rates and also to hold biennial sessions. An amendment by Mount Forest Lodge proposes biennial sessions, the next session to be held in 1902. Concord Lodge, Hamilton, asks to have the constitution amended so that any member 70 years of age and in good standing can apply to the order for his beneficiary certificate, and the order shall pay 60 per cent of its face value within 90 days, which shall cancel the certificate. Hamilton Lodge will ask to introduce the principle of direct legislation or what is known as the "Swiss Referen-

dum," in the legislation of the order. Grand Recorder Carder will present a very full report.
