CHOICE COLLECTION OF PLASTER CASTS

Exhibition Will Be Conducted by Froebel Society Next Week.

To anyone fond of beautiful things, the Froebel Society exhibition of plaster casts next week will be a source of pleasure. To those who have not visited the plaster shops of New York or Chicago it will be a surprise to find how beautiful some of the casts are, and how desirable for home deoration. Classical subjects of sculpture are shown in a series of Perry pictures and Elson prints, the plaster reproductions being chiefly from renaissance and modern sculptors.
