DISASTER ON MISSISSIPPI.

Steamboat Wrecked and Twenty-One Lives Lost.

Two Young Men Accidentally Electrocut—A Port Hope Miller Drowned.

DISASTER ON MISSISSIPPI.

Vicksburg, Miss., March 13.—The steamer Providence, plying between this port and Lake Palmyra, was capsized yesterday by a sudden squall at lone Landing, and 21 of her passengers and crew were drowned.
The dead are: Captain William Cassidy, of Vicksburg, master; Charles Roup, of Vicksburg, chief engineer; Clyde Scott, Vicksburg, cotton seed buyer; Dr. N. A. Lancaster, a prominent physician and planter of the Palmyra neighborhood; 17 colored rousters and deckhands, whose names have not been reported.
At two o'clock in the morning, just as the steamer was entering Lake Palmyra, a sudden wind and rainstorm of cyclonic proportions came out of the west, catching the Providence broadside on. The little vessel was lifted and tossed about by the waves, her upper works blown away and the hull turned bottom up in 40 feet of water.
Most of the crew and passengers were asleep at the time. The vessel was broken in two, and the entire boat's company were saved. The property loss will amount to several thousand dollars.

TWO MEN ELECTROCUTED.

Portland, Mich., March 12.—Frank Munger, jun., was instantly killed last night by an electric shock. He was returning home from town and passed an arc lamp which was not burning. He took hold of the wire cable by which the lamp is raised and lowered for the purpose of jerking it and jarring the carbons together, when he received the full current of 2,000 volts.
Chelsea, Mich., March 12.—As the 9 o'clock electric car going east on the D. Y. A. A. and J. Railway came into this station last evening, the trolley in some way gave out. Motorman Herbert Harrison and Conductor Pullen climbed on top of the car to adjust it, when both of them were badly shocked and burned. Harrison died from the shock.
A LEG BROKEN.
St. Thomas, March 13.—Nicol McNicoll, machinist, employed in the M. C. R. shops, had both bones of the right leg broken below the knee yesterday. He was tightening a piece of machinery with a wrench, when the wrench slipped and he fell backwards, breaking his leg as stated. Mr. McNicoll is 57 years of age and came here some time ago from Stratford.

SERIOUS RESULT OF A FALL.

West Lorne, March 13.—On Saturday afternoon Willie Doyle fell from the foundation of John Skinner's house and broke one of his ribs, which pierced his kidney. He was in a precarious condition for some time, but it is thought he is now out of danger.

SIX PEOPLE HURT.

Peru, Ind., March 12.—Two natural gas explosions early today wrecked two buildings and injured six people. Frank Kiley, sen., is supposed to be fatally injured.

MILLER DROWNED.

Port Hope, Ont., March 13.—A sad accident happened yesterday by which Wm. Douglass, miller at the Harold Barrett Company mills, lost his life. Shortly before 5 o'clock, owing to the quantity of water coming down the river, it was found necessary to take up some of the logs at the dam, and while so engaged Mr. Douglass was knocked off into the water below and drowned. The deceased had been an employee of the Barrett mills for 37 years. He leaves a widow and two sons and two daughters.

THE ONTARIO LEGISLATURE

Deals With Amendments to the Referendum Bill.

All Were Defeated—The Date for Voting Fixed for December 4.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
Toronto, March 12.—The first of the legislature's morning sessions began today at 11 o'clock, under sad circumstances, the death of Mrs. George W. Ross naturally casting a deep gloom over the proceedings. After short speeches of sympathy with the premier from the attorney-general and the leader of the opposition, it adjourned until 3 o'clock, the press of business and the necessity to get through with the session soon, making it impossible to adjourn for any length of time.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The principal business in the legislature this afternoon was the consideration of the railway subsidies, which were referred to the house by Hon. Mr. Laidlaw, commissioner of public works. Besides those which were published before, the government asked the house to grant subsidies to the Lindsay, Bobcaygeon and Port Hope Railway, running from Bobcaygeon to Lindsay, a distance of 19 miles; the Bruce Mines and Algoma Railway, from a point at Bruce Mines to Lindsay, a distance of 19 miles; the Nipigon Railway, from a point at Nipigon to Station to a point at or near the head of Long Portage, a distance not exceeding 14 miles, and to the Lake Superior, Longue Point and Nipigon Harbor, northerly, a distance not exceeding ten miles. The amount of the grant was fixed at \$3,000 per mile in each case.

Col. Matheson raised some objection to the subsidy to the Ironside, Bancroft and Ottawa road, which is to run from Kimbourn to Ironside Junction, a distance of ten miles, from Ironside eastward a distance of ten miles, and also from Palmer Rapids to Renfrew, a distance of 50 miles.

ONTARIO ELECTION ACT.

A large number of bills were given a third reading and passed, and then the house went into committee on Hon. Mr. Gibson's bill to amend the Ontario election act, by which it was proposed to abolish the registration oath.
Mr. Wardell declared that as a matter of fact everyone should be liable to the oath. No honest man would object to swearing that he had not been bribed. After some further debate the bill was adopted.

THE REFERENDUM BILL.

When the house went into committee of the whole to consider some more clauses of the referendum bill, Mr. G. F. Martner, North York, brought forward five amendments. They were all lost on division, and indeed were treated almost as a jest, no discussion being bestowed upon them. The first one was to have the election day to be the day of the municipal elections; the second to have a plebiscite on the day of the general elections; the third and fourth, to have majority votes of 55 and 60 percent, each to be more than half the total vote on the lists, and the fifth to have a 60 percent vote, the same to equal more than 55 percent of the listed vote.

DATE OF REFERENDUM.

The attorney-general announced that the referendum would be taken on the 4th of December.
Chief Justice Armour presented his commission from the governor-general appointing him administrator for the province, and the royal assent was given to two government bills.

THE JENISON POWER FRANCHISE

The Jenison power franchise, which has been somewhat of a millstone around the neck of Fort William for several years, was cut loose by the private bill committee.

vate bills committee of the legislature. The town, in company with Port Arthur, asked for the right to develop 10,000 horse power at Kakabeka Falls. Mr. Jenison opposed the grant on the ground that it would be an infringement on his rights. The town replied that Jenison had held the franchise for six years and done nothing, and that consequently his rights had lapsed. The private bills committee this morning transferred Jenison's powers to the town of Port Arthur, which must compensate him for work done and for plans, lands, etc. The water power will be used to operate the great flour mill. It is proposed to construct at Fort William and Port Arthur.

CABLE NOTES.

The shirt worn by Charles I. on the scaffold was sold at auction in London for 200 guineas.
The Italian Cabinet crisis is satisfactorily ended, the ministerial candidate for president of council being elected by 350 out of 402 votes.

ENDUM BILL BOUGHT.

Winnipeg, March 12.—Mr. W. R. Mullock, acting as counsel for the Dominion Alliance, has prepared a brief to place before the minister of justice at Ottawa, in which the legal reasons are fully set forth why the referendum bill is unconstitutional and should be disallowed. The brief was forwarded to Ottawa last night.

WIARTON SUGAR BEET COMPANY.

Toronto, March 13.—The Wiarton Beet Sugar Company obtained an injunction against C. L. Higgins, the Colonial Construction Company and the Union Bank, to prevent the payment by the Union of \$10,000, in the bank's care, to Higgins, in connection with the building of the Wiarton Beet sugar factory. Higgins, on behalf of the Colonial Construction Company, got a contract to build the factory for \$250,000, and \$14,000 has been paid on it. The claim is now made that only \$3,000 worth of work has been done, and that the \$10,000 in the bank's hands is not due.
