

Peach Pudding.—Cover the bottom of a baking dish with stale cake crumbs, cut, not rolled. Spread over this peaches which have been chopped fine and sweetened with granulated sugar.

Then add another layer of the siale Then add another layer of the stale cake crumbs, and repeated the alternate layers until the dish is full, with the last layer of cake. Bake until brown, about 20 or 30 minutes. Draw to the edge of the oven and spread over the top a meringue made from the well beaten whites of two eggs, two tablspoonfuls of sugar and the juice of half a lemon. Color a golden brown and serve hot, with cream or liquid sauce.
