It will be remembered that the proposed insurance bill introduced legislation which I. O. F. officials say meant members would have to be separated. the funds from one class not being available for the other, each to create its own reserve, which meant the ruin of the order. A protest was made, and the Dominion Government, under whose charter the order exists, has agreed to stay drastic measures if the order and other fraternal orders will do their own housecleaning.

That the supreme court in June will be asked to ratify the change in rates was confirmed today by Assistant Supreme Chief Ranger Harper.
