After tanning, there is the great care in dyeing. A small portion too much of the chemicals will cause the gloves, when in wear, to become hard and brittle. After getting them tanned and dyed successfully, comes the cutting. If a glove is not cut on the most scientific principle it will not fit correctly; and then comes the sewing. A little carelessness in this branch causes a lot of trouble. These are some of the difficulties the best manufacturers using the best materials have to contend with. How is it with the lower and cheaper grades of gloves made in Austria and Belgium, where the so-called kid is either the pelt of rodent or other small animal, and many of them the pests of creation. OVER-PAYMENT IS DIVIDED

A. N. Brady Tells How Metropolitan Bought Wall Street Franchise.

New York, Oct. 8.—Anthony N. Brady, testifying before the public service commission today, said that back in 1902 he had bought for \$250,000 the franchise of a company having the right to build a railway through Wall street. He resold the franchise to William C. Whitney, then the leading spirit in New York's surface lines, at cost.

In payment Mr. Brady received a check for \$250,000 from the Metropolitan Securities Company. Up to that time the Metropolitan, so far as Mr. Brady knew, had not entered into the transaction. Along with the check came instructions from the company's lawyers as to what was to be done with the balance of \$715,000 over the cost price.

In accordance with the instructions, Mr. Brady drew his personal check as follows: \$111,652.78 to Wm. C. Whitney, \$111,652.78 to Thomas F. Ryan, \$111,652.78 to Thomas Dolan, \$111,652.78 to P. A. B. Widener, \$111,652.78 to William L. Elkins and \$134,028.92 to Moore & Schieff, bankers. These checks were all sent by Mr. Brady to Mr. Whitney.

Show Only Brady Deal.

The books of the Metropolitan Securities Company show only the transaction with Mr. Brady. The full expenditure is being carried now by the Metropolitan as an asset. An examination of the Metropolitan Securities Company's books since 1898 show that President H. H. Vreeland of the street railway lines, has received \$200,000 over and above his salary for expenses. Of this amount more than \$185,000 is unaccounted for by any vouchers, so far as the commission's experts have been able to discover.

The accounts have turned up two payments of \$5,000 each to the Sergeant Cram in the spring of 1904.

These, it was said, were for legal services; both are charged to the "property and franchise" account, thus constituting an asset.

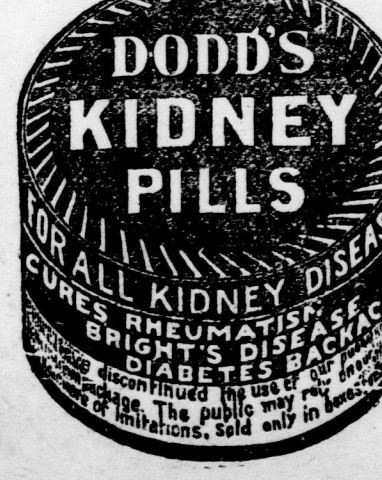
The Metropolitan Company made a roundabout loan of \$250,000 to Thomas C. Quinn, back in August, 1904, which was just before the Hearst-McClellan campaign. The loan has never been repaid.

No Vouchers Are Found.

Two payments for which no vouchers can be found were made by the Metropolitan Securities Company to Thomas F. Ryan, one of \$24,000 in June, 1905, and another of \$28,500 in August of the same year. Both were charged to a general expense account. The latter payment was made through the Standard Trust Company and Mr. Ryan's name does not appear in the Metropolitan's books in connection with it. Paul D. Cravath, counsel for the Metropolitan interests declared that the \$25,500 had been repaid.

Former Justice William Cohen sold to the Metropolitan Securities Company in February of the present year two blocks of Metropolitan Street Railway stock at 165 1/2 which was the price paid by his client two years before. The payment amounted to \$33,000. Metropolitan was quoted about that time at 105 and a sale of 200 shares was made a few days ago at 35. shares was made a few days ago at 35.
