The vastness of the wheat-produc-Ing area of Western Canada was recently dealt with by Hon. Frank A POLITICAL EARTHQUAKE IN Oliver, minister of the interior. There was under cultivation in that portion of the Dominion last year 10,000,000 acres, of which 5,500,000 were wheat. The production was 100,000,000 bushels of wheat, and 140,000,000 of other grains. The demonstrated wheat producing area is 1.200 miles long from the Red River in the southeast to the Peace River in the northwest, with an of 230,000,000 acres-23 times the area under cultivation last year. The greater part of this is included in the drainage basin of the Red and Saskatchewan Rivers, and the total is about equal to that of the five adjoining states of Minnesota, Iowa, the two Dakotas, and Nebraska. The Red River Valley of Minnesota and North Dakota is admittedly the best wheatproducing region of the United States, its total area being 13,000,000 acres. Its wheat-producing qualities are the chief reasons for the existence of St. Paul, Minneapolis and Duluth, of the Northern Pacific and Great Northern Railway systems, and for much of the commerce and wealth of New York.
