SUBSTANTIAL INCREASE FOR G.T.R. TELEGRAPHERS

Company Agrees to Increase the Monthly Rates by \$200,000.

[Canadian Press.]
Ottawa, Nov. 26.—The Minister of Labor today announced the unanimous report of a board established under the Industrial Disputes Investigation Act to deal with matters in dispute between the Grand Trunk Railway Company and the station and telegraph employees on its entire system to the number of 1,300. The result is a very substantial gain for the employees. The Grand Trunk Railway Company has agreed to increase the regular monthly rates by the sum of \$200,000 annually, one-half thereof to be granted on Jan. 1, 1914, and the balance on Jan. 1, 1915.

The acceptance of this arrangement and of the schedule of working rules proposed is recommended by the board to become effective from Jan. 1, 1914. J. G. O'Donohue, the employee nominee on the board, favored the inclusion of train dispatchers in the proposed schedule.

DEBATE ON FREE WHEAT OCCUPIES LEGISLATURE

Leader Declares That Western Farmers Are Being Exploited By Everyone.

[Canadian Press.]
Regina, Nov. 26.—With unabated vigor the Legislature continued yesterday the debate on the free wheat and flour resolution, the feature of the sitting being the reply to the Opposition leader by Hon. George Langley, minister of municipal affairs. He declared that the farmers of the west were exploited by nearly every other section of the community, being hounded from pillar to post by bankers, transportation interests and manufacturers. The relief lay, he declared, in two directions, in obtaining lower freight rates and in getting access to the United States market.

W. B. Willoughby, Opposition leader, denied the right of the Legislature to discuss or interfere in tariff matters, maintaining the tariff to be solely a subject for the Federal House. He moved an amendment to this effect.

His followers, however, have for the last three days debated every aspect of the question, their arguments being directed toward showing that the United States market has no advantage over the Canadian market.

Drillmen Strike for Shorter Hours

Would Only Work Eight Hour Shifts Instead of Eleven.

Amherstburg, Nov. 27.—Dissatisfaction with present working conditions and efforts to secure more pay street leading from Erie street built abutments at each corner, and on each of those he placed an electric lamp with a bare bulb that was an ornament to the street. Last Monday morning he found that some maliciously disposed persons had completely smashed three of them. He has offered a reward of \$200 for the conviction of the guilty parties.

A deputation of three drillmen from Ingersoll was here investigating gas conditions on Tuesday. It is proposed to supply Ingersoll, Beira, and even Brantford, besides London, from the Romney field. It is said they are already pushing it, which it forebodes the material shortening of the life of the field.

The Edison Company supply Leamington with light, and as soon as they were connected up and could secure power from the Edison Company they intended to give day and night service.

The surgeon performed the operation upon a public ward patient, a big lumberman, who little thought that he would ever receive attention at the hands of one of the world's eminent medical men, a court surgeon who last summer operated upon Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Connaught.
