## FAILURE OF TRAINMEN TO HEAR TORPEDOES CAUSED C.P.R. WRECK

## **To**rpedoes put ON TRACKS DID NOT EXPLODE LOUD ENOUGH

Eight Persons Lost Lives in C. P. R. Wreck Near

North Bay. ONE SECTION STALLED

Second Part of Train Crashes Into Rear of the One Ahead.

INQUIRY IS BEING MADE. North Bay, Jan. 26 .- An exhaustive inquiry was opened this afternoon into the cause of the rear-end collision near here on Sunday morning, between two sections of the Canadian Pacific express for Vancouver, when eight were killed and thirteen injured, among the sleeping passengers of the first section. Conditions caused by the severe subzero weather, which caused the first section to stall for lack of steam. coupled with the fact that the crew of the second locomotive failed to hear the exploding warning tor-pedoes set by the first train, are generally accepted as the direct causes of the accident.

Montreal, Jan. 26.—Failure of torpedoes to explode loudly enough to be heard above the roar of the train was the cause of the rear-end collision at Corbeil yesterday on the Canadian Padific Railway, in which eight or more persons lost their lives, according to reports reaching the company's offices here this morning. When the first section of the transcontinental train was stalled owing to the difficulty in raising steam through the extreme cold, its ing steam through the extreme cold, its crew went back along the tracks and fixed torpedoes to act as a warning to the second section.

The members of the crew of the second train report they did not hear the torpedoes, and their train ran on and into collision with the Pullman car which was telescoped.

ORDERS WERE DISOBEYED Ottawa, Jan. 26.—Orders to the central station staff to attach the private car of Charles Murphy, general manager of Canadian Pacific Railway, western lines, to the first section of the Vancouver Express, which was wrecked in a pitch-in at Corbeil yesterday morning were not carried out. #### Unhappy Marriages Responsible For Many Suicides in United States

New York, Jan. 26.-American newspaper editors appeared immuno rom suicide in 1919, according to a tabulated report of 5,121 cases in the United States, issued today by the Save a Life League. Of the professions, lawyers led the list with 43, of whom 12 were judges; 36 victims were physicians, 28 teachers, and 11 clergymen.

The list included 20 presidents of large business concerns, and more than 50 prominent club members millionaires and wealthy society women. Unhappy marital relations were responsible for about 350 tragedies, including persons killed by the self-murderer. Men outnumbered women 2,987 to 1,657, but of the child suicides 252 were girls and 225 boys. Ages varied from four years to an even
