NEW YORK MARKET WITHOUT FEATURE

Lacks Significance, But Speculative Issues Lead.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—Apart from the increased prominence of minor speculative issues, some of which extended their gains, there was little of note or significance in today's professional stock market session.

Opinion among traders seemed to be more confused, probably as a result of latest phases upon labor and industrial conditions and the detached attitude of the public.

Money rates were firm from the outset, but the six per cent rate was lowered to five per cent later, when it became evident that tomorrow's heavy payments to meet maturities on certificates of indebtedness and Liberty bond interest would be accomplished without strain.

A large proportion of the day's business again embraced the cheaper domestic oils, their activity being accompanied by further upward revision of prices for various products. Popular issues of that group were chiefly represented by Mexican Petroleum, although a three-point rise in that stock was reduced to 1 1/2 points at the heavy close.

Stocks and equipment, suffered losses of one to three points and rails led the general decline of the last hour with sugars, chemicals and rubbers. Sales amounted to \$35,000 shares.

A sharp recovery in sterling exchange quotations, for Eastern exchange, led to meet mid-October cotton and grain payments, was the feature of the foreign exchange market. Nearly all other European remittances were appreciably firmer, even the German rate showing some support. For Eastern exchange, notably the Chinese and Japanese quotations, also were better.

Liberty bonds and Victory notes were stronger by fractions to fifty fifty points, neither series, however, making new high records.

Total sales (par value) aggregated \$16,775,000.

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ALL GRAINS SCORE CHICAGO ADVANCES

Storage Reduction Guess Starts Wheat Lead Upward.

CHICAGO, Oct. 14.—Belief that the Government report tomorrow on stocks of wheat in all positions would provide bullish had much to do with a material advance today in wheat prices. The market closed strong, 2 1/2 @ 3 1/4 net higher with December 1 1/2 @ 1 3/4, and May 1 1/2 @ 1 3/4. Corn 5 1/2 @ 5 3/4 to 1c, and oats unchanged to 1 1/4 to 1 1/2. In provisions the outcome varied from a decline to a like advance.

Estimates as to the amount of wheat which the Government report would show to be on hand ranged from 500,000,000 bushels to 550,000,000 bushels, whereas the total last year was 608,000,000 bushels and two years ago was 747,000,000 bushels. Word that exporters had taken 500,000 bushels of durum and a cargo of hard winter wheat further strengthened the market and so, too, did dry wheat complaints from parts of Nebraska and Kansas. On the other hand, announcement of a railroad embargo against Galveston was largely offset by news of an active mining demand for wheat in the southwest.

Under such circumstances, bulls had a decided advantage during the last half of the session. Moderate declines earlier were ascribed chiefly to contentions that the present warehouse supply of all grain was excessive.

Corn developed firmness with wheat and as a result of gossip that throughout large areas the burning of corn as fuel this winter had become a practical certainty.

Oats sympathized with corn. Higher quotations on hogs helped to steady provisions, except that smaller packers' selling forced October lead and ribs to a new low level for the season.
