WILL INCLUDE WAGE CLAUSE

Special Garbage Committee
Decides On Provision To Be
Inserted in Contract.

WANT EFFICIENT SYSTEM

Frame List of Penalties For
Non-Fulfillment of Specifi-
cations.

The special garbage committee on Friday night, decided that a wage clause providing for the payment of a wage of \$25 per week of 53 hours, shall be included in the specifications for tenders for the collection and disposal of garbage by contract.

This was perhaps the most important feature of the specifications as prepared and as they will be presented to the city council.

The idea of calling for tenders is to get a more efficient collection of garbage, and as one alderman remarked, when the specifications are gone over, efficiency will be the highest, if the rules laid down are lived up to.

"The O. T. A. has nothing on this," remarked Ald. Judd, when the committee came to consider the penalties provided for in case the contractor does not live up to the terms of the contract, and for the most part the penalties as prepared by the engineer were approved without change.

An interesting point made on several occasions during the discussion was that the engineer's department shall tender on the specifications and the same rules and regulations shall apply if the contract is awarded his department as would apply to a contractor.

Centers on Wage Clause.

The main discussion of the meeting centered on the wage clause. Dr. Douglas, chairman, said that in his opinion a wage clause was not necessary, but it was open to the committee to act.

Ald. Drake said the desire was to have good respectable men on the job.

Ald. Ashton said the job of garbage collector was the hardest job he knew of. It was harder than delivering coal.

The discussion centered on this point for a time.

Dr. Douglas said that if wages dropped the contractor would not be able to take advantage of it. He said that a paving contractor would not be bound.

Counter suggestions flew back and forth. Engineer Brazier suggested that if wages dropped the contractor be allowed to cut his price and the city would reduce payment in keeping.

Ald. Judd said that the city would benefit from this. He reminded the aldermen that the specifications they were drawing were for the city, and not for the contractor. The contractor would read the specifications and put in his tender with his eyes open.

Ald. Ashton suggested a fixed wage, and Ald. Douglas said that by so doing the city would benefit, as it would get better service.

Finally the matter simmered down.

WOUND 2 IN NEW BELFAST RIOTS

Irish Republican Soldiers Fire
On and Burn Royal Con-
stabulary Cars.

PRIVATE HOME IS BOMBED

200 Raiders Armed With
Machine-Guns Seize Gov-
ernment Lorries.

BELFAST, March 3.—When three cars containing members of the Royal Irish Constabulary were leaving Tipperary for Dublin yesterday they were fired on and forced to halt before barricades which had been thrown across the road. It became known today.

Captain Galloway and Purdy were taken prisoners, and the other members were lined up in the street and searched by members of the Irish Republican army. Two of the cars were burned during the firing, and two of the police were wounded and sent to a hospital.

One of the most sensational features of the affair occurred when, during the firing, a policeman was seen to jump from a car with his arms in flames. He dashed madly down the street, but collapsed after having taken 50 yards.

A Sinn Féin went to his rescue and quickly stripped off the burning clothes, and had the man removed to the hospital for medical attention.

A police escort with seven motor lorries and one armored car was held up by 200 men at Dunkit, two miles from Waterford, this morning. The lorries, which contained government property, including rifles and ammunition, were seized and driven to an unknown destination. The monetary loss is estimated at £12,000. The police escort was not harmed.

The lorries were on the way to the Gormanstown camp, County Kildenny, which is the police demobilization centre.

The raiders were armed with machine guns and rifles.

A bomb was thrown this evening into the home of the Burnet family in Cupar street in Belfast. Two daughters were injured and taken to a hospital.

DONATES TUBES TO WESTERN "U."

To form a nucleus of a medical historical museum, a number of intubation tubes used by the late Dr. Joseph O'Dwyer have been donated by his sister, Mrs. (Dr.) J. R. McCabe of Strathroy.

Dr. O'Dwyer, who was a native of this district, was the originator of the intubation method of treating asphyxia in diphtheria, which has since its inception saved many lives. Included in the collection donated are original tubes of hard rubber, silver and metal alloys in various sizes, and the modern perfected tube.

This collection is to be placed on exhibition in the medical school. It is expected that Capt. Allan McCabe, a fourth-year medical student at Western, and a nephew of Dr. O'Dwyer, will address the Medical Historical Society of Western University on the life of his uncle and the intubation method of treating diphtheria in the near future.

EXTEND BENEFIT OF TRADE PACT

OTTAWA, March 3.—(Canadian Press).—The benefit of the trade agreement between Canada and France has been extended to Algeria, the French colonies and possessions, the territories of the protectorate of Indo-China and the territories of the Saar Basin.

The extension is granted on condition that satisfactory assurance is received that Canadian exports in these territories will receive the benefits of the said agreement.

TURKS LAUNCH "DRY" CAMPAIGN

Constantinople, March 4.—The Green Crescent, a Turkish committee organized to fight the use of alcohol as a beverage, is making a drive for prohibition in the Turkish capital. Pictures showing the results of intemperance are being shown in Al-Geria, the French colonies and possessions, the territories of the protectorate of Indo-China and the territories of the Saar Basin.

New York, March 4.—Failure of E. H. Clarke and Company, one of the largest brokerage firms, with membership in the New York curb market, was announced today. The house has offices in Chicago and several other mid-western cities and dealt largely in oil and copper shares.

A fact which has considerable bearing on the matter is that of the 23 members now elected to the house, something like 130 have not previously sat in the Commons Chamber.

CLAIMS MASH NEW KIND OF FOOD FOR CHICKENS

St. Thomas Man Arraigned For
Breach of the Inland Revenue Act.

ST. THOMAS, March 2.—Thomas Holland, a resident of the east end of this city, was arraigned in police court, Friday, charged with keeping a still and making liquor contrary to the inland revenue act, but because the court was unable to determine just what the evil-smelling liquors discovered on the premises were, the case was adjourned one week so that an analysis could be made.

Holland claimed that he was not guilty. He was merely experimenting to see if liquor could be made. He claimed that the liquids found were non-intoxicating. The corn and raisin mash, he said, was a new kind of chicken feed which he was endeavoring to make.

The prisoner learned that the liquor was to be analyzed, he generously offered to have it done for the court, producing a small medicine bottle to take a sample. The court refused the offer.

Holland was permitted to return to his home to care for the multitude of animals and birds he harbored.

A complete still, a keg of mash, and several gallons of liquor were seized at Holland's residence, Thursday afternoon.

PROPOSE NEW FORM OF DISTRIBUTION OF RELIEF

St. Thomas Aldermen Find Approp-
riation of \$2,000 Has Already
Been Used.

ST. THOMAS, March 3.—Because the appropriation of \$2,000 set aside by the city council for the distribution of free fuel among the destitute of the city throughout the year has already been extended, members of the city council will in all probability adopt a new method of administering relief at the meeting of the council on Friday night.

The subject was broached by Ald. Penhale, chairman of the relief committee, before a meeting of the 5 committee on Friday night. Ald. Penhale doubted the wisdom of leaving the distribution of fuel in the hands of the relief and public health officer. He believed that all relief work should be put in the hands of a committee, preferably the Women's B. and T. Society, which already distributes food and clothing among the poor.

Ald. Meenan stated that he was absolutely opposed to a one-man control and suggested that all relief work should be in the hands of a committee. He stated that all accounts of relief distributed should be laid before the council each month.

Ald. Penhale was asked to bring the matter before the council as a whole when a change will be discussed.

The chairman of the relief committee stated that he would request permission to exceed his appropriation, as people could not be left in want. He asked the committee to back him up in any action that he took.

Several of the aldermen expressed the opinion that people underserving of help were receiving it.

NEW YORK, March 3.—A bandit wearing a yellow mask today shot and wounded Benjamin E. Grimm, assistant treasurer of the Tiffin Products Corporation, in Long Island City, and escaped with a payroll of \$9,000.

Brooklyn, C. Mason, former flyweight champion, won the newspaper decision in a ten-round bout here last night with Jimmy Katz of Cleveland. The first six rounds were tame, and the referee called for some action. Mason was given a shade in the remaining rounds.

Toronto, March 4.—The members of the Ontario government returned at the parliament building nearly all day today in council meeting over the budget. It is expected the budget will be submitted Tuesday or Wednesday of next week.

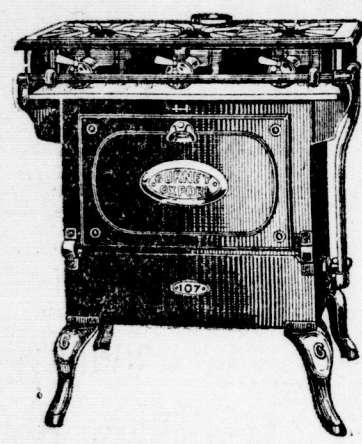
Former Postmaster of Brussels Works on Ontario Farm.
