SELECT FLOWER SHOW WINNERS

First Annual Meeting of Ontario Gladiolus Society Proves Success.

Officers Decide To Hold Convention Next Year in Guelph.

Special to London Advertiser. ST. THOMAS, Aug. 24.—The trial gardens of the Horticultural Society were a mass of beauty when the Ontario Gladiolus Society held its first annual meeting in the Alma College grounds here Thursday.

Many new and exquisite varieties of the gladiolus were exhibited to the visitors who attended, and local flower growers were generally congratulated.

While the Ontario Gladiolus Society is of recent creation, the membership is already substantial, and the officers hope that by education and the encouragement of those who make a study of flower culture the membership will be increased several hundred before the next convention, which, it was decided, will be held in Guelph.

With the exception of the secretary-treasurer, all last year's officers and directors were re-elected. John F. Marr of Guelph will act as secretary-treasurer in place of Rev. Perry S. Dobson, principal of Alma College, whose resignation was reluctantly accepted. Mr. Dobson was later elected as director.

The officers who were re-elected were:

President, Dr. F. E. Bennett, St. Thomas; first vice-president, William Brown, Elora; second vice-president, Claude Ward, St. Thomas; regional vice-president, W. B. Varley, Ottawa; Prof. J. W. Crow, Guelph, and James E. Brown, Kingsville.

The directors re-elected are: William Hart, Seaforth; S. F. Wood, London; Dr. A. V. Lester, Hamilton; C. C. Trull, St. Thomas; Prof. Coughlin, St. Thomas; Mrs. E. Ecker, St. Thomas; J. H. Bennett, Barrie; Mrs. G. Symington, St. Thomas; John F. Marr, Guelph; A. P. Conley, St. Thomas; Prof. H. L. Hutt, Georgetown, and Miss E. Lewis, St. Thomas.

A special tribute was paid to H. H. Groff, Simcoe, the pioneer hybridizer of Canada, and the creator of dozens of new varieties of gladiolus. In his election as honorary president of the society, on a motion by Miss Lewis, seconded by Prof. Hutt.

In advocating an educational campaign for the elimination of scrub varieties, Rev. Mr. Brantford stated that much poor stock was being offered on the market. His suggestion of a campaign in this direction will be taken up by the society.

Dr. Bennett suggested a province-wide plan along the lines followed in this city, exhibiting varieties in the store windows of the city with the names of the flower and the firms supplying the bulbs accompanying them. He had found that this was assisting in getting rid of scrub stock. The annual shows were also of great value, he pointed out, as visitors invariably noted the outstanding blooms on exhibition and purchased bulbs.
