#### The Drop in Rural Population.

The number of farmers in Ontario is decreasing and the city population is increasing. years Ontario's rural population has declined by 700,000, and recent years have contributed

This migration of the farmer has been a from farm to city a sinister thing, a cause for alarm, an evidence of decadency. The argument has been that agriculture constitutes the back bone of the country's wealth and that if our young men are no longer willing to stay on the farm, which was good enough for their fathers, things are reaching a sorry state of affairs.

A directly opposite conclusion, however, is appearing in the Dearborn Independent. Mr. Benson holds that fewer farmers are a good thing for farming and that the trend citywards is merely a natural and healthy result of greater productivity in farming methods. Statistics both in Ontario and the United States appear to support Mr. Benson's argument.

Ontario's decrease of 700,000 rural population since 1845 is matched by American figures. The first American census in 1790 showed that of each 100 population 97 were engaged in farming. In other words these 97 people produced only enough food for themselves and for three people in the city, with no surplus for export. The American census in 1920, however, showed that of each 100 population only 30 were occupied in agriculture, while 70 lived in cities and towns. The 30 farmers of 1920 thus supply with food themselves 70 other city dwellers, with huge surpluses for export to foreign markets In Ontario a similar decrease in rural populacrease in farm values. It is estimated that Ontario's farms have more than doubled in value in eighty years, while the crop of wheat, pats and barley during the last eighteen years alone has increased in value by the sum of \$134.667.000

These figures, both in Ontario and in the United States, mean, of course, that the productivity of the individual farmer has enormously increased. Thirty farmers in the United States now produce far more than 97 farmers a century ago; a greatly decreased farmer population in Ontario is producing a tremendous increase over the total of fifty years ago.


