Nicke, Plant Starts Work.

At 8 o'clock Monday morning the large plant of the International Nickel Company of Canada Limited at Port Colborne which has been in the course of construction the past twenty months started operations.

Only son of John More, General Manager of the Company put in the first charge, and the first metal came through the furnace at 10 o'clock and was heralded by the company's private whistle.

This plant will produce annually from twenty to twenty-four million pounds of copper and is so constructed that should the necessity arise its production could be quadrupled.
