SOME THOUGHTS ON A TIMELY SUBJECT

When Noah Webster laid the cornerstone of Amherst College, in Massachusetts, in 1821, he said the institution was founded "for educating for the gospel ministry young men in indigent circumstances, but of hopeful piety and promising talents." Times have changed. Of eighty-four men in the graduating class this year only one signified his intention of entering the ministry. Thirty-eight have gone into business, ten or more have turned towards the study of law and others have gone to medical and business colleges. One graduate, who has literary aspirations, announced at the close of the term that he would turn "holer," presumably in search of material and "local color" for literary work.

It is not surprising that business and the professions other than the ministry make a strong appeal to young men. The ministry as a rule is poorly paid. There are comparatively few churches whose pastors receive large salaries and there are many, with a dubious work attached, where the leaders remuneration is deplorably small. A vigorous young man may perhaps be pardoned if he asks why he should choose a profession whose members—the general public complacently assume—should be willing to make a sacrifice and ask no questions. Undoubtedly the man who enters the ministry is taught not to have undue regard for earthly things nor to place too much importance on material values; it is, moreover, his duty to preach that doctrine to his fellows. But the laborer in the vineyard is worthy of his hire, and should be placed in such a financial position as would enable him not merely to live in comfort, free from dread as to the future of his family, but to meet without straining his own resources the innumerable demands upon his sympathy and help. It is a curious fact that in theory ministers and teachers are regarded—as among the most useful members of society, upon whose shoulders great burdens of responsibility are laid, and yet they are not as a rule properly paid for their splendid services. Were our country not civilised to the degree that it is or Christianized to the extent that church history shows, this failure to appreciate more fully the work of our religious and educational leaders, would be more pardonable. As it is, existing circumstances and conditions reflect anything but credit on a people who profess liberality and who, ostensibly, are ready to

champion these builders and upholders of sound society. In Regisburgh, these facts ought to interest us vitally as a people of worthy ideals and worthwhile enterprise. Not a single young man in the whole county, to our knowledge, has in recent years entered the ministry. One young man, without thought of personal gain recently entered another branch of evangelical work but from all appearances there is not a single aspirant to ministerial or religious work of any kind. Ministers, and teachers as well, deserve much more generous treatment. As time goes on at least an occasional opportunity will present itself whereby church organizations, public spirited associations of one kind or another and citizens generally may be able to do much towards bringing about a better condition of affairs. Let us see to it that every move in this direction has our hearty co-operation and continued support.

EDITOR'S MAIL

The Editor of The Graphic:—Sir:—In a recent statement issued by the Presbyterian Church Association the following occurs:—"Do you know that under Church Union congregations are deprived of the right of calling their ministers as un-der the Presbyterian system. The right of appointment rests with the Settlement Committee, which has full power in the matter. This is one of a number of important changes which would be put into effect under present plans for Church Union. Do you want to retain the right to call your Minister?"

In the "Basis of Union", on the Ministry, Section 5 there is the rule:—"Any pastoral charge, in view of a vacancy, may extend a call or invitation to any properly qualified minister or ministers, but the right of appointment shall rest with the Settlement Committee, which shall report to the Conference for information only." Comment is unnecessary.
