CHARITY GETS ALL IT ASKS

THE EXECUTIVE DECIDES TO MAKE NO REDUCTION IN GRANTS. Debitures for Forty Thousand Dollars To Be Issued for New Schools in Order To Be Away With Rented Rooms-The Salary Reduction To Be \$7000 Instead of \$15,503.

THE REGISTRATION BILL

THE LIFELINE DEBATE OF THE LEGISLATURE.

Mr. Meredith charges that it was framed with a deliberate purpose to subvert Party Interests-An Amendment that Registration by Proxy be Allowed Voted Down.

The Ontario Legislature yesterday went into committee on the bill respecting the Registration of Manhood Suffrage Voters in certain cities.

Mr. Meredith assailed the bill in strong terms as framed with a deliberate purpose to subvert party interests to gain a miserable party advantage. It was intended to cut down the vote of their opponents, and he meant to avail himself of every possible rule of the House to delay its passage.

Its effect was to destroy all that had been done at much trouble and expense in Toronto to put names on the list. Had they no regard for the convenience of the people?

Mr. Tait defended the bill as calculated to provide a satisfactory manner of registering manhood voters.

Calls it an Outrage. Mr. Clarke said the measure was an outrage. So far as the 10,000 or 12,000 names recently put on were concerned every opportunity was given to strike off names if they were improperly on the list. If the bill were adopted not one-half of the young men fairly entitled to vote could be registered.

Mr. Balfour said it was altogether probable that the number of names now on the list were of men not rightly entitled to vote, as large lists of names had been put on by individuals but by both political parties.

An Insult, Says Mr. Meredith. Mr. Meredith declared that the suggestion that manhood suffrage voters were more likely to be guilty of fraudulent registration than others was an insult.

Mr. Hardy said it was absurd for those who had been clamoring for full and fresh voters' lists to object to the measure. The existing lists of Toronto were made up by men who were carrying stacks of affidavits signed in blank, and it would have been absolutely impossible to have them properly reviewed by the judge. He claimed that the Liberal party had fully its share of the young men voters.

Registration by Proxy. Mr. Meredith moved an amendment to the effect that personal attendance for the purpose of registration shall not be necessary, but that the voter shall be registered, unless it be shown that he is not capable of the required qualification. He explained that the effect of this would enable the present lists to be used.

Mr. Hardy charged that for some reason or other the preparation of the Toronto lists had been unduly delayed.

Mr. Meredith's motion for \$45,000 of the salary of the City Relief Officer Taylor was increased from \$4000 to \$10,000.

\$40,000 For New Schools. Aid. McArthur made his report on the need for increased school-accommodation, submitting figures as to rented rooms: Fern-avenue—Three rented rooms, 141 pupils; applying and not admitted, 53; temporary class in Queen Victoria, 54; total 233; in addition there are 48 applicants at Gladstone not admitted.

There are altogether 31 rented rooms, 275 pupils; not admitted, 11; total 286.

Borden-street—Four rented rooms, 230 pupils; not admitted, 7; total 243.

Ryerson—Three rented rooms, 154 pupils; not admitted, 5; total 159.

Holtz-avenue—Five rented rooms, 246 pupils; not admitted, 5; total 251.

There are 211 pupils now applying to get in who cannot be admitted. He suggested that \$40,000 be allowed for new schools and that the city issue debentures for that amount. This would give \$19,000 for Fern-avenue school, \$14,000 for six rooms at Givens-street and \$10,000 for four rooms at Holtz-avenue.

Aid. Lamb proposed that the whole \$70,000 be allowed for new schools.

Aid. Crawford asked that the smaller amount be taken out of the estimates. He did not approve of issuing new debentures. For this Aid. Crawford, Jolliffe, Graham and Frankland voted. This was lost.

The salary of relief officer Taylor was also defeated. Aid. Lamb voted alone for the \$70,000. Then it was decided to grant \$40,000 by way of debentures.

Aid. Lamb and sub-committee of the Board of Works yesterday visited the Board of Health, and decided that it was not in the public interest that the siding should remain on the street.
