"DRYS" PREPARE FOR REFERENDUM

Local Organization Completed at Meeting Yesterday.

PLAN MASS MEETING.

Rev. Ben Spence to Speak to the Workers.

Tentative arrangements were made at a meeting of the London Prohibition Association yesterday for a mass meeting next Sunday of the citizens interested in the cause of temperance, which will be addressed by Rev. Ben Spence, head of the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance, and Dr. A. S. Grant, president of the Ontario Referendum Committee. It is known that both leaders will be in the city over the weekend and no difficulty is anticipated by the committee in securing them to address the local workers.

T. D. McCullough was unanimously elected official secretary of the Prohibition Association and A. B. Dewberry, military secretary of the Y. M. C. A., was appointed as full time, paid assistant. The latter will assume his work on March 15 and will assist in the organization of the dry forces.

E. E. REID CHAIRMAN.

Other appointments which were made included the naming of E. E. Reid to the chairmanship of the finance committee; T. H. Yull to that of the publicity committee, and Rev. Matthew Kelly to head the committee on prayer. It is regarded as probable that Mr. Reid will conduct a financial canvass at an early date in order to raise the funds necessary for the educational campaign which must precede the vote.

REFUSES TO NAME ANOTHER NURSE

Health Board Think Present Staff Can Do More.

CAFE BY-LAW LEFT OVER.

Advances in Salaries of Three Officials Made.

Charges that the public school health nurses are not doing the work the city might expect of them marked the estimates session of the Board of Health yesterday. Chairman Cunningham remarked that "they seem to be taking it easy." Commissioner Saunders stated that "half of the children sent home were sent by the teachers and not by the nurse," and the medical officer of health also pointed out that there was no apparent need of increasing the staff of public health nurses while school nurses failed to follow up cases.

Mr. Saunders stated: "The nurses say: 'You're sick, go home! And that's the last of it as far as they are concerned.'" Accordingly the board did not add a public health nurse to its staff, but Miss Patterson's salary was raised and she will be furnished with an automobile in order that her work may be extended. The medical officer of health's salary was raised \$500, the sanitary inspector received a \$200 raise, and raises were given other employees. All of these, however, await the approval of the Council.

CENTRAL CITY GARAGE

Dr. Cunningham asked the board to recommend to the Council that a central city garage be established, and all cars of the various departments kept there. A move towards economy and efficiency as recently adopted by the Public Utilities Commission.

The total estimates of the board for 1921 total \$19,400 outside of the plumbing inspector's department. And for that department \$704 is estimated in excess of receipts. It was intimated, however, that master and journeyman plumbers' license fees may be done away with by the City Council.

Dr. Cunningham broached the subject of pasteurization, but was opposed in this by ex-Chairman Saunders. "I can't tell the difference between pasteurized and unpasteurized milk," said the chairman.

"Your wife will know if she has to do any baking," said Mr. Saunders. The matter was left over for future consideration.

When the proposal that a second public health nurse should be employed came up, Mr. Saunders said: "What's the use of appointing another nurse when the school board's nurses don't do any more, apparently, than tell a child: 'You're sick, go home!'"

Chairman Cunningham said: "The school nurses do seem very negligent in that respect, they should follow up cases and find out how the child is getting on."

Dr. Downham suggested that the public health nurse should be given an automobile and thus increase her efficiency by 150 per cent.

The chairman agreed with the M. O. H. by pointing out that the school nurses "seem to be taking it easy."

The restaurant by-law and appointment of a city statistician will come up at a subsequent meeting.

INCREASES FOR TECHNICAL STAFF

Advisory Committee Recommends Salary Commission.

ESTIMATES CONSIDERED.

To be Presented at Special Meeting of Education Board.

After passing measures, to be approved by the Board of Education at its meeting to-day, granting increases of \$200 to each of eight teachers and \$400 to H. B. Beal, principal at the London Technical and Art School, the advisory industrial committee of the Board of Education last night approved a recommendation made by Arthur W. White and seconded by Mrs. Tanner that in future all salaries under the jurisdiction of the Board of Education be dealt with by a salary commission.

In passing this recommendation it was realized nothing could be accomplished this year as it would take at least three or four months to deal with the perplexing and complex salary question. All teachers at the Technical School were included in increases with the exception of one.

Estimates for 1921, amounting to something like \$70,000, were discussed and sent back to the principal for alterations, which are to be ready for the special meeting of the Board of Education to be called shortly to deal with estimates generally.

PLAN SINKING FUND

The question of setting aside \$4,500 as a sinking fund and interest in the erection of an auditorium and gymnasium for the school was set aside to be dealt with later this year. There was some talk of being able to start building the \$100,000 structure next fall so that if an unemployment situation arose next winter, such as this winter work could be provided for several persons.

EUGENE MUNSON SPEAKS.

An interesting lecture was given last night before the Theosophical Society by Eugene W. Munson, of Los Angeles, Cal., on "The Hidden Side of Things." In this he described the invisible forces working through feasible forms, with many analogies and illustrations in physics attempted to show how the pure spirit of man's higher self finally manifests out here in the physical world.

His main point was that the energies and power of the soul working down into the physical body would receive a reaction from the body that gradually aroused the sleeping or semi-conscious spirit to action and self-consciousness. This mutual process, Mr. Munson said, of action from above and reaction from below, organizing the bodies and awakening the soul, is the method by which evolution is accomplished.
