TO BE REUNITED AFTER 48 YEARS

Dundas Woman Locates Brother In Iowa.

THOUGHT HIM LONG DEAD

John Leahy Prospered, But Lost All His Wealth.

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Iowa, July 1.—After having been separated for 48 years, each believing the other dead, Miss Margaret Leahy, aged 78, of Dundas, Ont., and her brother, John Leahy, aged 76, of Council Bluffs, Iowa, are to be reunited through the board of supervisors of this county.

Leahy left in 1876, and a year or so later lost track of his sister, Margaret Leahy, the only remaining member of the family. He came to Council Bluffs, became a building contractor and was successful. Some years ago he lost his health and his property and became a partial invalid and almost a charity patient.

Some months ago old friends of Leahy took up the search of his sister for him. She was finally found in Dundas and wants her brother to come to that town and live with her. Before accepting him as her brother Miss Leahy wrote a number of questions relating to things which occurred during their childhood days and sent them to Leahy to answer. The answers were satisfactory and a letter has just come from her asking that her brother be sent to Dundas to live out his remaining years with her.

"I was informed by the New York police 22 years ago that my brother had died in that city," Miss Leahy wrote the Council Bluffs supervisors. "I had been searching for him for years, but, believing the New York report, ceased my search and have mourned for him as dead."

Miss Leahy says she is unable to pay her brother's way from Council Bluffs to Dundas, but that she is able to take care of him once he is with her. The county supervisors will pay his railroad fare and expenses of the trip.

CONNECTS FASCIST WITH KIDNAPPING

Party Treasurer Confesses Sums Paid To Seize Deputy.

NO TRACE OF MATTIOTTE

Others Under Arrest Say He Was Murdered.

ROME, June 30.—Giovanni Marinelli, treasurer of the Fascist party, arrested several days ago charged with complicity in the kidnapping of Giacomo Mattiotti, millionaire Socialist deputy, confessed to-day that he had paid out huge sums from the party funds to have Mattiotti kidnapped. It was not announced if the confession dealt with the reported murder of Mattiotti.

Others under arrest contend that Mattiotti was murdered and the body hidden by orders of persons higher up in the Fascist circles. Dumini, the leader of the gang of kidnapers, has been pronounced insane and will escape punishment.

He gives a different version of the affair every time he is examined. He says he was present at the actual kidnapping, but says he returned to Rome after the body was placed beside a lake.

GERMAN JEWISH LEADER MURDERED IN CAIRO

CAIRO, Egypt, July 1.—Dr. Dahan, leader of the Orthodox Ashkenazic (German) Jews was shot and killed by unidentified persons last evening in the Jewish quarter of Cairo.

WINDSOR TRAVELERS ARE ALLOWED TO DEPART

Edward Dooley and Edwin Cooney Arrested Here for Trespassing on C. N. R.

Police court yesterday was of brief duration. It lasted just long enough to give the "go-ahead" signal to two knights of the road, who made a brief stay at police headquarters on their way from Windsor to Montreal.

The men were Edward Dooley and Edwin Cooney, both of the Border City. They were apprehended while trespassing on the property of the C. N. R. and were taken into custody by Police Constable Black.

After hearing their stories, and on the understanding that they would lose no time in being on their way, Magistrate Graydon permitted them to leave London.

One drunk was also an occupant of the prisoners' box and was fined the usual amount of \$10 and costs.

DECLARE SCHOOL BOARD IS LIABLE

For Accidents To Children On School Premises.

AND ON WAY TO AND FROM

Parents' Stand Despite Toronto Judge's Decision.

According to many parents whose children attend the London Technical School, justice went awry with the decision of Judge Widdfield in the Toronto court when he dismissed action for damages brought against the Toronto Board of Education by the parents of a pupil who was injured at one of the schools.

Judge Widdfield held that the Board of Education was in no way responsible for the pupils and his decision is considered by the board here to have a great bearing on the two or three damage claims which are pending against the board for accidents similar to that in Toronto.

The local board members are of the opinion that, since civil law is mainly a question of precedence, the local board is, by the Toronto decision, relieved of legal responsibility in the cases pending here. A number of citizens interested in the matter declare, however, that this belief on the part of some of the local educational officials is entirely erroneous, and especially in the case of the Technical School, where the board is liable for any injuries sustained by pupils while on the school premises.

QUOTE REPORT CARDS.

To support this attitude the citizens quote from the Toronto School report cards, which state that, together with a number of regulations of the department of education, "pupils are responsible to the principal for conduct on the school premises and on their way to and from school, except when accompanied by the principal or a teacher."

They claim that if the pupil is responsible to the principal, then the principal and the Board of Education is responsible for the pupil.

Should this be the case the Board of Education will not only be liable for accidents which occur on the school premises, but will also be liable for the persons of the pupils from the time they leave their homes until the time they are back at school. Accidents which happen on the street before or after school, and in which the pupils are injured, would then be the responsibility of the board.

Will, according to this stand, make the board liable to damages which result from such an accident.

Officials of the board, however, forward the argument that the statement on the report card covers only the matter of disciplinary responsibility and not physical.

The entire matter now stands as a difference of opinion and no definite settlement can be made unless the present damage claims which the board now faces are taken into the courts and a decision reached by a jurist.

BEATEN TO DEATH AT CHINESE DOCK

Report of Edwin C. Hawley's Death Confirmed.

FOUGHT WITH JUNK MEN

Over Loading of Cargo of Oil On To Steamer.

PEKING, July 1.—(Associated Press Cable).—An account of the slaying of Edwin C. Hawley, employee of a British export firm, at Waihsien, Shewan Province, June 19, received here by mail from Chungking, confirms earlier reports that he met death at the hands of Chinese junk men.

The junk men resented Hawley's effort to move a cargo of wood oil by steamer, though they were prevented from handling the freight themselves by the activities of bandits. They had threatened death to anyone attempting to load the wood oil on a steamer.

Hawley demanded protection of the military authorities and it was promised him. The British steamer Wan-Lui, on which he proposed to load the wood oil, anchored across the river from the city and preparations were begun for the loading. Thereupon the junk men attacked the cargo still on the wharf.

The British gunboat Cockshafter, at Hawley's request, was preparing to send men to guard the cargo, but Hawley went ashore without waiting for the party from the gunboat. The junk men scouted, Hawley caught and kicked one and the others turned and attacked him.

Hawley ran toward the river, expecting to swim to safety, but was clubbed over the head and fell into the water. His own boatmen rescued him and took him aboard the gunboat, where he died.

TWO BOYS KILLED IN DYNAMITE EXPLOSION

HALEY'S CROSSING, Ont., July 1.—Two boys were instantly killed, one being blown to atoms, an elder sister was seriously hurt, their father and mother were stunned, an infant was buried under an avalanche of plaster, laths and boards, but uninjured, and a home was totally destroyed as the result of an explosion of two cases of dynamite at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Alex. Delarge, Sunday. The body of Nelson Delarge, aged 13, was blown in all directions, and his shirt was found on a raft, several hundred feet away. Morris, aged 8 years, was decapitated.

LIQUOR PROBLEM AGAIN TO FORE

Resumes Prominent Place In Politics of Motherland.

DUE TO BISHOP BURGE

Head Divine of Oxford Asks For Conference.

London, July 1.—With the demand of the Labor Government to appoint a round table conference to discuss licensing and reform, the liquor question has again come into prominence in the political life of this country. Bishop Burge made his suggestion as soon as it became clear that the liquor popular control bill, which he introduced in the House of Lords last week, was headed for overwhelming defeat.

This is the first measure looking toward wholesale reform of liquor laws since the Licensing Act, which was passed in 1902, and which has been down the hours for sale of liquor, subject to discretionary powers of local magistrates—passed Parliament three years ago. The bishop's measure is backed by 22 of his colleagues on the Episcopal bench and would apply to England the scheme of local option already in force in Scotland.

It is proposed that a compulsory vote be taken every three years in defined areas as to whether or not the present system remain unchanged; two, that saloons be closed altogether; three, that they be owned and managed by the state. If a prohibition vote were cast, however, there would be no further poll held in that area, so that the voters would have no opportunity to change their minds after deciding on a dry experiment.

NOT PROHIBITION.

The bishop's plan thus goes further than the Scottish scheme of local option, for there some are as first wet and have already reverted to a wet condition. The sponsors of his bill, which has won the strong support of the Astors, insist it is not their intention to obtain prohibition, directly or indirectly, but in view of the manner in which the proposal is drafted, its opponents are featuring arguments alleging it would have this effect.

It is always so with temperance reformers, declares The Morning Post editorially. "They try to force the public to give up drinking. They fail, and as a last resource they try to trick the public into giving up drinking by what they call 'popular control'."

Even in papers more favorable to temperance the bishop's bill has been quite severely criticized. The moderately conservative Daily Telegraph declared it a "comparatively unjust bill, which public opinion will be surprised to find is backed in so large a measure by Episcopal sanction."

Again, The Manchester Guardian declared the bill to justify the words "popular control" in the measure.

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THE COMMONS DIVIDED.

Even if the House of Lords were to pass the bill, it would then depend on co-operation of the House of Commons, and there is no question on which Labor is so sharply divided as on this one of liquor control. The difference in views ranges all the way from the prohibition stand of Philip Snowden and Arthur Henderson to a strong desire to leave the saloons alone on the part of other equally important Labor leaders, while in the rank and file of the movement there is even some resentment to the restrictions now prevailing.

Whether the reform scheme, which the Labor Government has proposed, is likely to emerge from a round table conference such as is proposed remains to be seen. Any proposal touching the liquor trade is bound to generate a lot of heat in this country, and the position is complicated still further by quarrels among the reformers themselves.

There is general agreement, however, that for the saloons there should be substituted decent hostilities where all kinds of food and drink can be obtained. This is a reform which is bound to come sooner or later. Aside from this, it is most doubtful whether the country is prepared to stand for any more reform than what The Daily Telegraph calls "the voluntary vocation of our people, who are learning more thoroughly every year the merits and virtues of true temperance and who need no additional compulsion."
