Begins Monday, Feb. 2nd. Continuing Till Feb. 28th—Staff and Outline of Course. Social and Personal Notes.

### The Course.

A course similar to that of last year will be arranged for first term students, covering the general needs of those unable to attend courses at the Agricultural College, Truro. For the second term students, work of more advanced and detailed nature will be undertaken.

Students are requested to report to the Principal on Monday afternoon, Feb. 2nd at 1:30. Students should enroll with a view to attending continuously, part time students will only be admitted to special classes.

Beside the regular course of studies there will be demonstration debates, moving pictures, music and athletics.
