

The Ladies' Temperance Aid Society,

—(OF RICHMOND, QUE.)—

At a regular meeting of the above society, held at Caxton Hall, in the Village of Richmond, on the evening of Friday, the 28th day of March, 1879,—The Lady-President in the chair—the following resolution was adopted by an unanimous vote :—

MOVED, SECONDED AND

RESOLVED,—“That we, the members of the Ladies' Temperance Aid Society, of Richmond, Que., deem that it is all important to the great Temperance cause in this County that the “~~Dunkin~~ Act” be not repealed on its submission to the popular vote on the 15th of April inst. And, as we know that our sex, through our fathers, husbands, brothers and sons are the great sufferers from the deadly traffic in intoxicating liquor—

Therefore, be it resolved that we do herein earnestly beg our sisters, the women of this County, to join with us in using their strong influence, together with their prayers to Almighty God to continue to us the benefit of Prohibition legislation.

And furthermore, be it resolved that copies of this resolution be printed in the local papers and for general circulation.

The above Society is composed of women of various nationalities and creeds who have banded themselves together as an “Aid Society” in the grand cause of Temperance.
