ART. XIII.—Clinical Contributions. Case of Delirium Tremens from the Use of Opium. By James Crawford, M.D., Professor of Clinical Medicine, McGill College.

It may be necessary to offer some apology or explanation for applying the above designation to the following case, but I nevertheless conceive that it legitimately comes under the widely extended, although rarely appropriate term delirium tremens, as generally applied. The inappropriateness of any of the various terms, which are used to designate this peculiar form of delirium, must be admitted, and cases like the present cannot with propriety be either termed delirium tremens, delirium cum tremore, delirium ebriosorum, mania a potu, or any of the various synonymes which have been used to distinguish it, derived as they have been either from its most frequent cause, or from one of its most prominent symptoms. It is admitted that this peculiar form may originate from various other very different causes than the abuse of spirituous or fermented liquors, and therefore it cannot with propriety bear the generic term of "ebriosorum" or "a potu," and such like, and as it is by no means universally accompanied by tremor, even when induced by a debanch, this term is by no means, therefore, characteristic of the disease. It cannot be doubted, too, among other causes, that the most highly landed remedy we possess, our very sheet anchor in the treatment of delirium tremens, opium, may (secundam Hahnemann) be the direct and obvious cause of the disease, other narcotics in like manner, as well as various depressing excesses, or serious injuries, are acknowledged as causes, and show the inappropriateness of the term. In the latter case, to obviate the difficulty, the word traumaticum is substituted. If the disease were not already overburthened by its numerous appellations and that custom has established the term, I would prefer selecting the discriminating term from a symptom, which I think will be found more
