OIL—ALLEGED DIVERSION OF TANKERS DESTINED TO EASTERN CANADIAN PORTS—ASSURANCE BY COMPANIES THIS WILL NOT HAPPEN

Hon. Robert L. Stanfield (Leader of the Opposition): Mr. Speaker, I wish to direct a question to the Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources. Has he been able to confirm that oil tankers destined for eastern Canada have recently been diverted and, if so, whether these tankers are now on their way to eastern Canadian ports or are still being diverted to other ports?

Hon. Donald S. Macdonald (Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources): Mr. Speaker, further to my telegram yesterday I have had replies from Canadian refiners, particularly the two refiners mentioned by the hon. member for Yorkton-Melville yesterday. In both cases the Canadian firms categorically deny that there was any diversion of tankers, saying that in both cases if it had been done by their affiliated companies they would have been advised, and that there has been no interruption in shipments. In relation to the allegation by the hon. member in regard to Imperial Oil, and his suggestion that a shipment from the Arab states was diverted, I should say that in fact Imperial advises that all of its oil stock comes from Venezuela.

Mr. Stanfield: Mr. Speaker, last week the minister met with representatives of the major oil companies. At that meeting did he seek any assurance and, if so, did he receive any assurance that tankers destined for Canada would not be diverted? I ask this particularly in the context of the Arab states in the Middle East having cut their deliveries to the United States.

Mr. Macdonald (Rosedale): Yes, Sir, I sought that assurance. The companies in question indicated that, of course, this would be subject to whatever sanctions might apply at the point of shipment. I have since been advised that a shipment to one company at least, to Portland for transit to Montreal, has been held up by the Arab states.
