Abroad they operated against the natural enemies of the kingdom; at home, against the enemies of the national freedom, and of the Protestant establishment made at the Revolution; against those, who preferred the odious, tyrannical government of the accursed race of Stuart, to the mild and legal government of the House of Hanover; against those, who held to the divine, indefeasible, hereditary right
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
