PUBLIC MEETING TO-NIGHT
ON STREET BY QUESTION
 Citizens Invited to Show The
 Attitude to Impress the Powers
 —City Hall Notes.

TO-DAY AT THE CITY HALL.
 11 a.m.—Board of control.
 2.30 p.m.—Special committee on
 hydro-electric celebration.

With the object of affording an im-
 proved street railway to the powers
 higher up of the hostility of many citi-
 zens towards the pay-as-you-enter
 system on the street cars, the board of
 control yesterday afternoon held a
 public meeting in Massey Hall to-night.
 Controller Spence suggested the meet-
 ing, and the mayor said he had already
 arranged for one on Saturday night
 next. On receiving Corporation Coun-
 cillor Drayton's statement that the On-
 tario Railway Board had agreed to
 hear the city's motion for a discontinu-
 ance of the pay-as-you-enter system
 on Friday next at 2.30 p.m., it was
 agreed to hold the meeting to-night.
 The local members of the legisla-
 ture will be asked to attend and the mayor
 suggested that Manager Fleming be
 asked to represent the company's side.
 Mr. Fleming said last night that he
 was not indulging in any speculation
 as to the effect the meeting might have
 nor was he prepared to say whether the
 company would be represented.
 "I have nothing to say except that
 this system is working finely," he re-
 marked.

To Boost Bylaws.
 The board has under consideration
 the launching of a campaign in support
 of some at least of the money bylaws.
 Controller Spence suggested that the
 details of the bylaw for civic car lines
 should be made known to the public,
 and Controller Foster proposed that
 the same be done with the Bloor-street
 bylaw. Controller Church favored
 holding public meetings, while Con-
 troller Spence thought the city should
 follow the street railway by advertising
 in the papers. Controllers
 Spence, Foster and Church were ap-
 pointed a sub-committee to frame up
 a course of action.

At the board of control meeting, the
 mayor announced that work on the
 new intake pipe recommended by Wa-
 terworks Engineer Fellows should
 start next March. His worship es-
 timated that the intake would cost
 \$250,000.

Purifying the Water.
 Analysis of city water shows that
 the power of hypochlorite of lime
 reduce to a striking degree the quan-
 tity of coliform bacilli per cubic centi-
 metre, continues undiminished. The
 tests show comparison between the
 bacteria at the shore crib where the
 water has not been treated and at the
 pumping station at the foot of John-
 street after the process. The following
 figures are striking:

Indian Hunter Heavily Fined.
 Frank Commando, a member of the
 Ojibwa band on the Nipissing Indian
 Reserve at Beauport was heavily fined
 at North Bay for a breach of the game
 law by shooting five beaver, three
 muskrats and 33 partridges. For killing
 the beaver a fine of \$100 was imposed,
 for killing the muskrats the fine was
 \$15, and for killing the partridges the
 fine was \$165—\$280 in all. Counsel for
 the Indian will appeal.
