WOULD MOVE INDICTMENT TO THE HIGHER COURTS

Toronto Railway Co. Pleading That Questions Involved Are Too Intricate For a Jury to Pass Upon.

The Toronto Railway Co. will to-day, at Osgoode Hall, apply to Justice Ridgell, to have the indictment charging damage to the company's passenger service and family cars and fenders returned by the grand jury of the sessions court, removed from the jurisdiction of that court, to that of the higher courts, because of the "intricate questions and points of law" involved. Crown Attorney Baird will oppose the motion.

The motion asks for a writ of certiorari, to remove the indictment and "for such further orders as the judge may seem meet." An affidavit by James Gunn, superintendent of the railway, mentions the alleged difficulties created by the city when the company endeavored to carry out the Ontario legislation. On Oct. 1, 1910, the city, to build new lines to reduce over-crowding, to carry out which it would cost the company \$2,000,000, but concerning which, the company has already spent several hundred thousand dollars. The fenders, he says, are those approved by the railway board in May, 1908, and recalls that an indictment returned by the grand jury against the company in Oct. 1910, was never pressed. The affidavit continues:

"I am advised by counsel, and verify believe, that intricate questions or points of law will arise on the trial of the said indictment, and I am advised by counsel that the legal issues involved are too important for the decision by a jury, and the defendant company with the facts laid before a judge of the high court, to which said indictment may be traversed."

The questions asked in the affidavit are:

(a) What are the respective abilities of the city of Toronto and the Toronto Railway Company under the original contract between them with regard to the alleged overcrowding?

(b) Whether, having regard to the fact that the jurisdiction in respect of such matters has been by the Ontario Legislature committed to a judicial tribunal, including the questions as to whether the fenders and other carriages are a protection to the company, if compiled with, and such questions involving very large sums of money, the company can be indicted for committing a common nuisance.

(c) That the attempt to indict the company before the court of general sessions is, in effect, an attempt to indirectly bring within the jurisdiction of an inferior court questions which by reason of their importance should be determined by a higher court.

(d) Whether the company can be indicted for a common nuisance, when they have complied with the railway board's order.

(e) Whether the company can be indicted without first obtaining the consent of the railway board.

(f) Whether this indictment is not really a proceeding instigated by officials of Toronto, for the purpose of endeavoring to influence the Ontario Railway Board, when dealing with questions involved in the case and the railway are concerned.

(g) Whether a fair trial can be had in the County of York.

(h) Whether by reason of the action of the city council and by reason of the almost daily comment in the public news, the City of Toronto or the Toronto Railway Board, some prejudice has not been created among that class of persons in the City of Toronto and portions of York County from whom the jurymen are selected, and that a fair trial cannot be had in the jurisdiction of the court.

MAKING WORK FOR MAGISTRATE

New Street Railway Rules Result in Several Court Cases.

F. F. Macklem, a street railway conductor, was fined \$1 and costs by Magistrate Kingsford yesterday for assault on Roy Bellier.

"I was sitting between two ladies and the conductor hit me right here in the eye. There's a sore there that I pushed past the conductor by the crowd getting on at Avenue-road. It was a 'pay-as-you-enter' car, and the conductor was punching a transfer. I got out to give him my transfer, but he couldn't take it and I went into the car. He hit me again where I was sitting and took my transfer, then he came back and started to tell me," Then Bellier told the conductor to mind his own business and the conductor then punched him.

James Skipper had tried to jump from a car while it was moving, and George Downey had grabbed him. Then he hit the conductor. It cost him 45 or 50 days.

W. H. Hynes was fined \$1 and costs because he rang the bell violently several times to stop a car, which had changed its route unexpectedly, and whence created disorder.
