MACLEAN "THE FAKIR" AND RECIPROCITY

Remarkable Confirmation of His Diagnosis of the Reci-

procity Deal in the Taft-Roosevelt Letters.

Confidential letter from President Taft to Ex-President Roosevelt ten days before the latter signed the reciprocity proposal.

"It [reciprocity] might at first have a tendency to reduce the cost of food products somewhat. Meantime the amount of Canadian Western Canada and the United States that WOULD MAKE CANADA ONLY AN ADJUNCT OF THE UNITED STATES. It would transfer all their important business to CHICAGO AND NEW YORK, WITH THEIR BANK CREDITS AND EVERYTHING ELSE, and it would increase greatly the demand of Canada for our manufactures. I see this is an GOOD ONE."

"It [reciprocity] will be unpopular in New York because of the dairy interests. It will be unpopular in Minnesota because of wheat. Of course IT WILL BE SAID AGAINST IT THAT WE ARE TAKING AGRICULTURE AND MAKING IT SUFFER FIRST.

In my interview of August 24 with In my interview of August 24 with Mr. Perkins, he set forth a number of considerations which seem to me of great weight. He said that his company had endeavored to obey the law in every respect and had carefully put itself in line with the policy of the administration: that the interests he represented including not only the International Harvester Company, but also the farreaching Morgan interests generally, had originally favored the creation of the bureau of corporations and the policy of the president which that bureau represents, and that, both in their attitude toward the bureau and in their conduct and management of their various concerns, including the United States Steel Corporation, they had adopted a similar policy of frankness and publicity; that, so far as he was aware, they had not been guilty of any violation of the law extensions. any violation of the law, certainly none involving a moral considera-tion; that, as he phrased it, he was now being laughed at in New York by the Standard Oil people, who were saying that he tried to be good and keep solid with the ad-ministration, but that now he was going to get the same dose with other people who had not followed such policy.
