ROOT CHOSEN CHAIRMAN

He stepped up to Senator Root, shook hands and conferred with him for several minutes, leaving just as Root resumed his seat.

When Mr. Root resumed the entire rear part of the floor and gallery was empty, and those who remained to hear spoke to the front and the empty seats.

Calm After Storm.
Mr. Root continued his speech to a quiet and attentive audience. Here and there he elicited a ripple of applause, particularly when he touched upon the state constitution of the tariff administration.

Senator Root's tariff comment evoked a ripple of cheers. Predicting a Republican success in the fall election, he was given a hand of applause.

Hadley's Inexpressible.
Senator Root concluded his speech at 7:35 p.m. and was applauded.

The formal appointment of the minor temporary officials followed.

Senator Clark, who was wearing a mood that until rules were adopted the convention would be governed by the rules of the national convention.

Mr. Watson of Indiana offered the formal motion for a roll call of the states for elections to the various standing committees.

Governor Hadley, who had again taken a place on the stage, renewed his motion to substitute a Roosevelt list of delegates for the temporary roll made by the national committee.

An agreement had been reached that after the motion was made the convention should adjourn with the Hadley substitute list the unfinished business to be taken up immediately on convening.

It was 7:45 p.m. when the convention adjourned until to-morrow at 11 a.m.

Chairman Root Speaks.
Mr. Root spoke in part as follows: "Gentlemen of the convention: "Believe that I appreciate this expression of confidence. I wish I were more competent for the service you require of me."

"The struggle for leadership in the Republican party, which has so long engrossed the attention and excited the feelings of its members, is about to be determined by the selection of a candidate. The varying claims of opinion for recognition in the political creed of the party are about to be settled by the adoption of a platform."

"Without these things, there can be no party worthy of the name. Without their aid, party association is a rope of sand, party organization is an ineffective form, party responsibility disappears, and with it disappears the right to public confidence."

Warns Against Individualism.
"Without organized parties, having these qualities of coherence and loyalty, free popular government becomes a confused and continual conflict between the interests of individuals in opinions, individual interests, individual attractions and repulsions, from which effective government can emerge only by answer to the universal popular vote of confidence," he said.

WORLD'S CROP OUTLOOK

GENERALLY FAVORABLE

Broomhall's weekly summary of foreign crop conditions follows: United Kingdom—There are some complaints regarding wheat and oats crops as a result of wet cold weather, as warmer temperatures are desired.

France—Crop outlook generally favorable, although there are some complaints regarding dry weather. Supplies of native wheat are nearly exhausted and foreign wheat is being bought in all directions.

Germany—Crop outlook favorable for native wheat and rye. Supplies of native wheat are light, and foreign demand shows improvement.

Romania—Some authorities say that the wheat crop will be smaller than that of last year. Our correspondent, however, believes that the crop will average one. The corn crop is backward but is expected to improve.

Australia—General beneficial rains for the sustenance fund committee through this fund the salaries of ministers would be voted to \$800 for married men in the north, and \$750 for married men in the south.

At luncheon they were the guests of the Manufacturers' Association and the board of trade at the Royal Canadian Yacht Club.
