NEED EDUCATING ON SAFETY ZONES

Regarding the safety zones recently marked out at the civic car stopping places along Danforth avenue, many enquiries are being made by the residents throughout the district as to their purpose and the rules governing motor and wheeled traffic with regard to the white lines.

Many passengers hesitate about standing inside the "safety zone" while waiting for cars and prefer to stand on the sidewalk while drivers of motors and wheeled vehicles in many instances drive right over the white squares in ignorance of their object.

In many cities in the United States the residents are familiar with "safety zones" and are fully aware of their usefulness. The idea has been recently introduced into Toronto, and it is necessary to protect passengers while waiting for and stopping off cars. They are perfectly safe standing inside the zone, and all wheeled traffic must keep outside and drive slowly past the white lines.

LAG DAYS PLANNED FOR RECEPTION HALL

WELCOME TO VETERANS.

A welcome will be extended to the returned veterans, members of Hope Methodist Church, Danforth avenue, on Sunday evening next, who have recently returned from overseas. The honor roll of the church contains the names of 80 men of the congregation, who enlisted for active service during the war, four of whom paid the supreme sacrifice. Of the remainder, with one exception, all have returned to the church, and the forthcoming welcome will be the third in connection with the returned soldiers of Hope Church.

SEEKING SOLUTION OF HUN FINANCE PROBLEM

Weimar, July 14.—The finance ministers, premiers and diplomatic representatives of the individual states and the Austrian minister to Germany, Professor Hartmann, gathered in Weimar Sunday on the invitation of Finance Minister Erzberger to discuss an imperial income tax and the general financial problems of the German Empire. A plan was presented under which it is intended as soon as possible to transpose the taxation systems of the individual states into a unified imperial system. Herr Erzberger announced that in the interest of trade and industry the existing examination of foreign letters and telegrams will be abolished, also it will be continued on packages and registered and insured letters. New measures, he added, will be taken to prevent evasion of taxation in the realm by means of payments in stocks and bonds. The next meeting, will discuss Erzberger's plan.

GOLD QUARTZ DYKE NEARLY A MILE LONG

LePas, Man., July 14.—Measuring twenty feet wide and five thousand feet in length, a solid dyke of quartz containing gold has been found at Copper Lake, north of here, by J. P. Gordon, ex-chief engineer of the Hudson Bay Railway. Mr. Gordon states that the values are uniform throughout and assaying between nine and fourteen dollars to the ton. Incoming prospectors confirm the report of the discovery and a mild rush has already begun to the scene of the strike. Copper Lake is east of the Elm Flon copper mines, and it is also the scene of the finding of fish fossils a short time ago.

DEFER ENFORCING HIGHER COAL PRICE

A royal commission of experts. He, however, was strongly opposed to nationalization. After further debate, Mr. Bonar Law announced that if the miners' leaders would give an undertaking that there should be no stoppages or strikes in the coal industry, the government would accept Mr. Bruce's suggestion of a committee of inquiry, and postpone the six shilling increase for three months.

Enforcement Deferred Mr. Bonar Law thereupon agreed to defer enforcement of the increase from July 16 to July 21, in order to give time for consideration of the matter.

Effect on Industry The minister presented to the house a great mass of figures for the purpose of showing how industrial changes in hours and wages were increasing the cost of coal and thereby affecting the whole of the country.

Mr. Eric said it was dangerous to suppose that Great Britain would have during the coming year much surplus coal for profitable export, because competition was very keen. American coal at Atlantic ports, he added, was almost exacting the same price as the British.

The Americans also are offering long term contracts on coal to the miner declared, "and if we are forced in order to maintain our hold on the market, to follow their example, our profits must be further reduced."

Sir Eric earnestly urged the leaders of the miners to do their utmost to persuade the miners that this was no time for doing less than the maximum. He said the miners would work to the limit of their capacity, he said, he had little fear but the government, he said, was able to run the risk of bringing down the price of coal.

Sports on the work instigated and carried out by the Dominion command. Secretary Brockbank in prefacing his report, said that the convention did not assemble to represent a political party. Comrade Wilson, in his report, dealt specifically with the industrial committee, on which he had sat at the convention. The committee had found that the government, who were the people, were responsible for the present industrial unrest.

HAMILTON NEWS

Hamilton, July 14.—The decision of the department store section, board of trade, to observe the nation-wide holiday next Saturday, will have an influencing effect on the smaller stores, it is said. Orange leaders here are keenly disappointed at the poor response of citizens to the appeals for support of the Orange and True Blue orphanage. Hamilton's objective was \$25,000, but not more than \$5,000 was subscribed. The street collections on Saturday totaled about \$1,000.

FORM ASSOCIATION TO LOWER FLOUR PRICES

Chicago, July 14.—The Millers' Export Association was formed today for the purpose, according to its members, of lowering the price of flour to the domestic consumer at the expense of Europe. Millers from twenty-six states were in attendance. It is expected the association will comprise 300 of the country's biggest flour makers who deal in export trade.
