Mr. Maclean: I would have this parliament pass the necessary laws, and I would have this government enforce these laws, instead of casting the burden of their enforcement upon a province or a private prosecutor who would have the minister of justice a public prosecutor, like the attorney-general of the United States, who is now in New York.

Favors G.T.R. Acquisition. Mr. Maclean then turned to the subject of railway nationalization, and favored the immediate acquisition of the Grand Trunk.

National Merchant Marine. In closing Mr. Maclean advocated a national merchant marine, a reform in our banking and currency, a reform in the modernization of our postal savings banks.

Mr. Maclean was followed by Lavigne, Liberal member for Quebec County, and mayor of the City of Quebec. After referring to the League of Nations given by the ancient city to the Prince of Wales, Mr. Lavigne savagely arraigned the Union government for its waste of public money at Quebec.

Tenders submitted by several contractors on sidewalk construction work were so far above the engineer's estimates that the suspicions of York township councillors were aroused yesterday, and the awarding of contracts was held up pending a new report by the engineer.

Deputy Reeve Graham said he had asked a certain contractor whether he was willing to contract sidewalk work, and this individual had replied that he was not, because he had been told to "mind his own business." His business was suggested to be water main work.

Several of the lowest tenders were at least 50 per cent. higher than the engineer's estimate of what the work should cost. They figured over \$8 a foot against \$1.50 paid for the work a short time ago.
