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TO BLESS AND GLORIFY IS MISSION OF WOMAN

Rev. J. D. Freeman Preaches Annual Sermon to Graduates of Moulton College.

"The mission of woman is to bless, to elevate, to glorify humanity," said Rev. J. D. Freeman in his sermon to the graduates of Moulton College at Bloor-street Baptist Church Sunday morning.

Special field and mission lay in the direction of the ministry of consolation and comfort. He would not take a narrow view of woman's sphere. The realms of art, literature, of science, of manufacture were open to her. Let her enter any of them for which she might be qualified, but in whatever sphere she might move it was for her to shed an influence that would ameliorate the hardness and selfishness which curse the world. As Frances Willard aptly put it: "To make the whole world more hospitable."

The secret of that indefinable quality called charm was in the possession and exercise of unfeeling sympathy. However noble the form or fair the face, if sympathy be lacking its absence would practically nullify all other attractions, for it was this quality which gave the largest power of blessed influence in the world.

"Do not suppose that domesticity is opposed to intellectuality," he said. "If you multiply true place you will find it even a post-graduate course, adding that perfection which no college course can confer."

True womanhood was of a royal nature. While rank imposed its obligations, and there must be perfect agreement between rank and character. And the process of character-forming was slow, patient, even lifelong. There was the gift of truth to be wrought. This was the finest character. Beauty of face, dress and disposition were leading to truth as alchemists to a digger. After it was multiplied, without it they were nothing. A woman unreliable, untruthful, deceptive was a plague spot on society.

There was the gold of purity. Gold was the symbol of incorruptibility; it would not tarnish. Into her character every true woman must weave this element. There must be purity of act, speech and thought, otherwise she had dropped from her royal rank.

Mr. Freeman's remarks were especially directed to a delineation of "The Royalty of Christian Womanhood," and were highly appreciated by the large congregation.


