REPORT TO GOVERNMENT.

On Treatment of the Emigrants at Fesserton.

Seven hundred "new citizens" out of the 4000 which arrived by the S.S. Empress of Ireland, Tunisian, Ottawa and Carthaginian reached the city within the past two days. They are a very superior lot, and include many wives and children, who have come out to join husbands in the new homes they have provided. Most of them are going to points in the province outside the city and will reach their destinations to-day.

Albert Chamberlain and F. Sexton of the British Welcome League, and Mr. T. of the Ontario Immigration Bureau, have returned to the city from Fesserton, where they went to investigate the complaints of the nine families who were stranded there on Dominion Day. They report the men have in no way overstated their case. They are preparing a statement of the facts, which will be laid before the government to-day.

Meteorological Office, Toronto, July 7.—(5 p.m.) Fine weather has prevailed to-day throughout the greater portion of Canada, but local showers have occurred in Saskatchewan, Manitoba, New Ontario and the Maritime Provinces. Maximum temperatures exceeding 80 have been recorded in many parts of Ontario, but elsewhere temperatures have been moderate.

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CAR OFF TRACK RUNS IN PARK

Woman Passenger and Motorman Hurt—Man Injured in Second Accident.

Carelessness, it is said, on the part of street railway employees caused two accidents yesterday.

A southbound Broadway car traveling at the rate of 15 miles an hour, making the curve opposite Langley-avenue, jumped the tracks, crashed over the boulevard, and came to a sudden stop in Riverview Park. One passenger was injured, the others were badly shaken up.

Mrs. Emily Armstrong, of 53 Wolfray-avenue was thrown against the seats, sustaining injuries to the head and face, also a severe shock. She was carried into the office of Dr. T. A. Gallagher, who attended her until the arrival of her husband. She was taken home in a carriage. The smashed up trolley was left in the park.

An eastbound King-street trailer became detached opposite Lee-avenue yesterday afternoon. The conductor on the trolley (No. 801) excitedly gave the motorman three quick stops, with the result that the trailer, coming pretty fast, collided.

JAPAN HASN'T THE COIN TO START WAR JUST NOW

London and European Opinion on the Present Differences Between U.S. and Japan.

LONDON, July 7.—The present tension between the United States and Japan is exciting the keenest interest among all the European diplomats. None of them, however, believes that it will reach the stage of warfare, because the heavy burden of debt Japan has put in operation a law whereby she is obliged to obtain indemnity from Russia for her bankruptcy on a similar costly enterprise in the next decade. It is believed that the next step is the United States is acquiring the enmity of Japan as one of her national assets which may prove the handiest card in event of trouble with any other power.
