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On the whole the show is excellent, and only goes further towards the end, which is a considerable rural dialog is introduced that would not be missed if left out. There are two performances daily.

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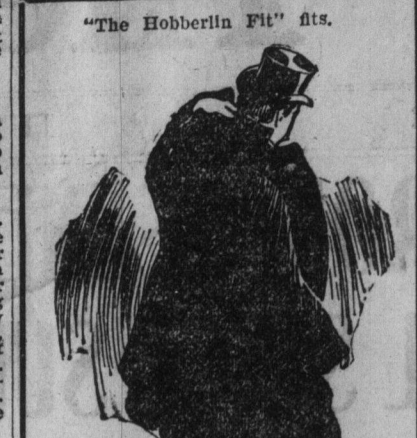
