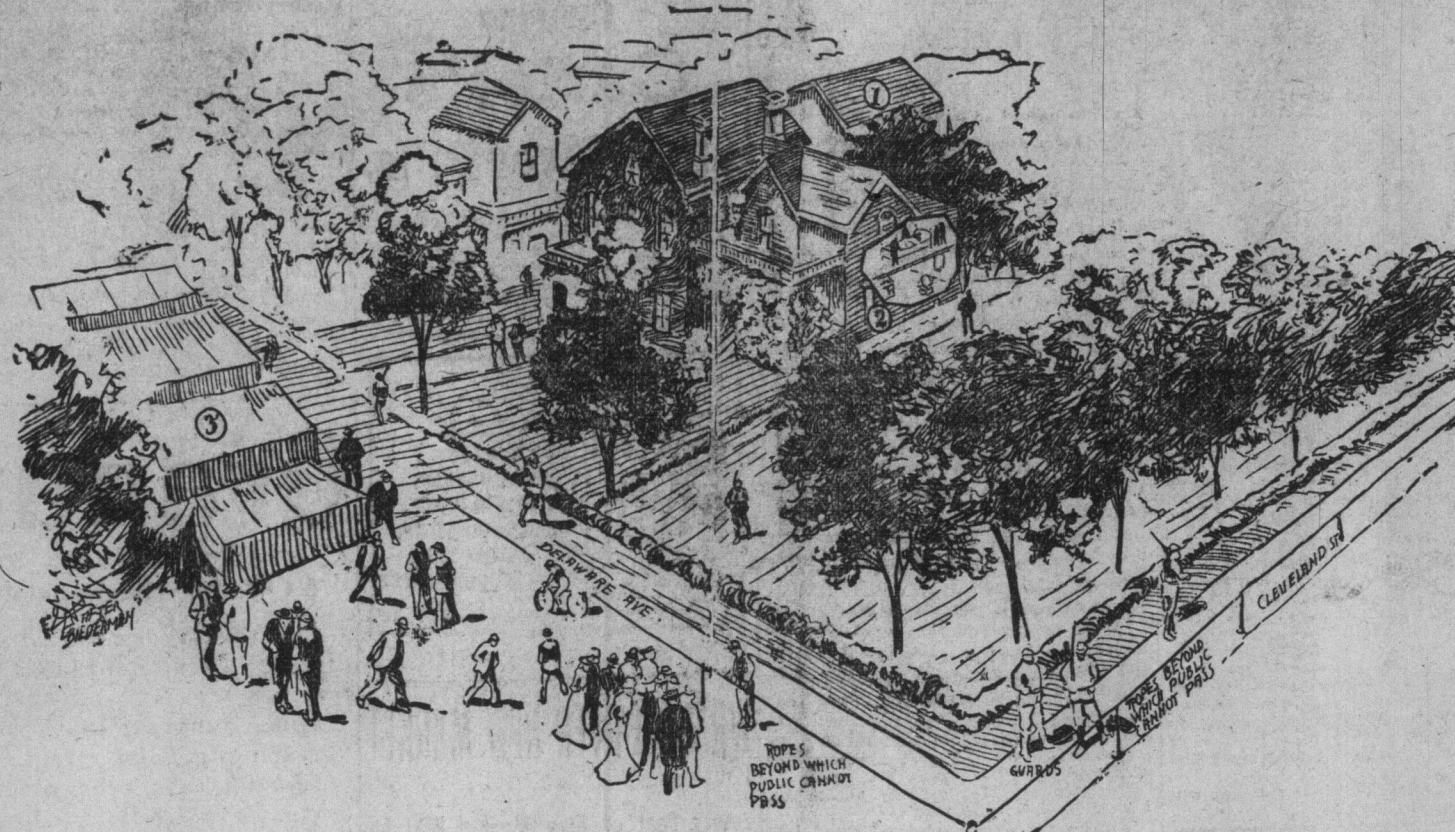

**ALL BULLETINS GAVE HOPE**  
Distinguished Patient's Condition Improving, and He is Comfortable Without Pain.  
Relatives Return to Their Homes

**BIRD-EYE VIEW OF MILBURN HOUSE, WHERE PRESIDENT IS LYING**



**PROBABLY CONVALESCENT IN A WEEK**  
Even if Improvement Continues Will Not Be Moved for Three Weeks.

Milburn House, Buffalo, Sept. 9.—After the 9 p.m. bulletin had been issued from the Milburn residence to-night, announcing a continuation of the favorable condition of the President, there were many indications that the bulletins were not mere indications of real improvements of the distinguished patient.

At 9:45 o'clock Miss McKinley, a sister of the President, Dr. and Mrs. Hermann Bauer, the latter a niece of the President, the Misses Barber, niece of the President, left the house, and, taking carriage, announced their intention of returning to their homes to-night.

Abner McKinley accompanied them to the station, and said: "The nearest relatives of the President are so confident of his recovery that they have no hesitation in leaving."

Dr. Hermann Mynter, one of the consulting physicians of President McKinley, said to-night:

"I have always made it a point not to prognosticate in such cases, for I never know man proposes and God disposes. I consider the President's case a serious one and so I do not predict, but I may say that at this stage of the occurrence the condition of the patient is quite remarkably favorable, and personally I cannot anticipate anything but recovery."

Dr. Eugene Wadon, who was with Dr. Mynter, said: "I, too, am averse to making predictions, but I agree that the President's condition is one that strongly favors complete and rapid recovery."

Dr. M. D. Mann, who has Dr. McBurney as a guest, was seen after the last consultation to-night. He said: "I am gratified at the excellent showing made by the President, and the remarkable manner in which the case is being handled. It is a very unusual case, but I have no doubt that it will be a happy one. I feel confident that the President will be well again in a week or ten days."

During the day the following bulletins were issued by the President's physicians:

**8:30 p.m.—The President's condition continues favorable. Pulse 112, temperature 101, respiration 27.**

**9 p.m.—The President's condition improves, and he is comfortable without pain or unfavorable symptoms. Bowel and kidney functions normally performed. Pulse 123, temperature 101, respiration 24.**

**9:30 a.m.—The President's condition is becoming more and more satisfactory. He is comfortable, and his bowels are less likely to occur. Pulse 112, temperature 100.5, respiration 23.**

**PRESIDENT TELLS DOCTOR THAT HE MEANS TO LIVE**

**HOPE PERVADES HOUSE**  
Milburn House, Buffalo, N.Y., Sept. 9.—"God's contribution to the American people will be the sparing of the President's life." As the evening shadows were falling tonight, John G. Milburn, President of the Pan-American Exposition, reverently uttered these words as he stood before the house in which the nation's patient was lying so bravely with death.

**Need for Gage.**

The reports the physicians have given out are facts as they exist, the scientific standpoint unmixed with sentiment.

**One Fear Disappears.**  
Dr. McBurney, the most eminent of the physicians in attendance, expresses the opinion that, if the improvement continues, it will be a week yet before the President can be pronounced out of danger and convalescent.

**Patient Cheerful.**  
The President himself has been cheerful all day and has expressed confidence in his recovery. Today he asked for a morning paper, but, of course, had to be denied it. It is with some difficulty that he can be restrained from talking, and Col. Myron Herrick of Cleveland is quoted as authority for the statement that he has spoken at intervals of several things he proposes to do in the future.

**Will Be No Crisis.**

**FIRST OF SERIES OF CRIMES**  
**ASSASSIN'S LIFE IN PRISON**

Police Have Emma Goldman Already Has a Ravenous Appetite and is Given Under Surveillance Meals Not on Ordinary Near Chicago. Bill-of-Fare.

**LEGISLATION ON ANARCHY FAVORED**  
**POLICE DENY HIS LUXURY OF A SKOKE**

Officers All Over the States on the Search for Evidence of Conspiracy.

Buffalo, N.Y., Sept. 9.—That there was a conspiracy, in which many besides Crosova were concerned, and which had the destruction of President McKinley as its purpose, is the firm conviction of all the members of the cabinet, and of the Buffalo police. An agent of the United States secret service to-night told me that the theory is held that Emma Goldman, the Anarchist, was the prime mover in this plot, which may have contemplated a series of crimes, of which the murder of the President was the chief.

It can be stated on absolute authority that this woman teacher of Anarchy will be expelled if evidence of law can be found for such an act. Moreover, she will not go alone. Holding to the theory that the Anarchists conspired against the constituted authority and the government of the United States and planned the assassination of President McKinley, the members of the cabinet will urge that strenuous efforts be made to locate her. Secretary Root is particularly earnest in urging this.

It can be stated on full authority that national legislation will be proposed at the next session of Congress looking to the suppression of Anarchy. It is held that Crosova was not the only one who had been anything more than a mere instrument under the control of the real conspirators. That other and important arrests are contemplated in the near future is known to be a fact.

**HUNTING FOR EMMA.**  
Chicago, Sept. 9.—Nine alleged Anarchists, under arrest here, were brought before Magistrate Prindle to-day. At the request of the city the hearing was postponed until Sept. 10, in order to allow a complete investigation of the charges against the prisoners conspired to assassinate the President. Several Anarchists, who were arrested here, are now in the hands of the police.

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**Camera Frenzies.**  
Chicago has been making the Police Headquarters of Buffalo a famous place. All yesterday hundreds of people, most of them strangers to the city, went to see headquarters. Most of them realized that it would be impossible to see the prisoner, and they were satisfied to stand around the street, and just gaze at the building which was headquarters of the man who had murdered the President. Many of them, however, entered the building, and a few were foolish enough to ask to see Crosova. They were turned down with any kind of answer, and some of them left the building angry because their request had been denied.
