WINDSOR JOCKEY CLUB OFFERS LARGE PURSES

Horsemen Will Pull Down \$70,000 in 14 Days' Racing.

Figuring expenditures in overnight purses alone at an average of \$500 for each event, the Windsor Jockey Club has decided to offer horsemen that compete at its plant July 14-21 and August 15-22 more than \$70,000 in 14 racing days. This amount is exclusive of a little more than \$30,000 that has been apportioned in stake and handicap events, the foremost of which is the Frontier handicap, \$10,000 added. During the 14 days of racing there will be 98 races of all descriptions decided. Ten of these will be stakes, and the remainder will be handicaps. Every day of the 14 there will be at least six of these affairs, days on which a feature is scheduled drawn by turning a wheel. Messrs. Hendrie and Palmer, president and secretary respectively of the Windsor Jockey Club, have been making the stake events attractive, planned to encourage the small fry to show their colors at the pioneer track in Windsor this year.
