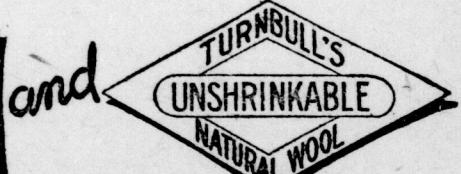

BOLSHEVİK BLACK HAND DIRECTED AGAINST CANADA WHEN WAR BEGAN

Germany Provided Funds Six Months Before Outbreak of the War.

WASHINGTON'S EXPOSE Documents Reveal German Socialist Scheidemann as a Run Among Huns.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—Another convincing link in the proof that Germany was preparing to start a war of world conquest at least six weeks before the outbreak of the war is revealed by the disclosure of the Austrian help-appears at Sarajewo, concludes the amazing series of disclosures which the American Government has given to the public through secret documents brought out of Russia.

Two authenticated documents are included in the final chapter of the story which began a week ago with evidence removing any doubt that may have existed that the Russian Government, headed by Lenin and Trotsky, is a tool of the Imperial German Government.

One of these is an original circular from the German general staff, dated June 8, 1914, directed to the industrialists for the purpose of opening their secret instructions for industrial mobilization.

Bomb-Band in Canada. Another, dated November 20, 1914, is from the German naval general staff, and reveals that within four months after hostilities began in Europe "destruction agents" were ordered to Canada and the United States to hire anarchists and escaped criminals for the bomb plots and the work of sabotage in the United States into the war.

In addition to this authenticated evidence, Edgar Simon, who obtained the papers for the committee on public information, offers a group of circulars put in Russian text at Petrograd last winter purporting to be copies of documents taken from the archives of the counter-espionage bureau of the Kerensky government, supplemented by some from the files of the same bureau before the fall of the czar. Some of this matter has been published previously in France and in this country.

Agents Abroad Before War. The circulars tell of German arrangements six months before the outbreak of war for the establishment of industrial agencies in bordering neutral countries, which later furnished the money for the Bolsheviki. The circulars also reveal that German banks to establish close and secret relations with American and British banks; of the launching of revolutionary propaganda against the czar's government in Russia as early as November, 1914, and of German diplomats in all neutral countries to co-operate with agencies set up in those countries for stirring up social unrest and sentiment against war, within the enemy states.

Scheidemann a Real Hun. The name of Scheidemann, the German Socialist leader, already mentioned as involved in the dealings of the German Government with the Bolsheviki, appears attached to one of the unauthenticated documents. It is a note announcing that 150,000 kroners have been placed to the credit of a Russian newspaper, and asking that warrants (the name of Scheidemann's organ at Berlin) be advised of what appeared in the subsidized journal.

Comments Doctor For Good Work. GODERICH, Sept. 20.—The charge laid by John Pyre, employed by Ontario Medical Council to investigate charges against persons practicing medicine and surgery without a license in the province, against Dr. Metcalfe of Detroit, who has had a summer residence in Bayfield for the last 25 years, for practicing medicine without being registered, was heard here today at 1 o'clock before Magistrate Chas. Reid.

Dr. Metcalfe said he performed operations on E. P. Merner, who runs a general store in Bayfield, and also on Wes. Merner of Elmira; John Townsend of Goderich, and J. C. Reid of Varna. The counsel for the plaintiff endeavored to show that the defendant was practicing to hire, pay or hope of reward. This he did not prove. J. C. Reid, one of the witnesses, said that he offered Dr. Metcalfe \$200, which the doctor refused, saying that he could make no charge, as he was not registered here, and advised him to give the money to the Red Cross.

Mr. Merner, another witness, also stated that the doctor told him that he could make no charge, but that he would willingly do the operation for him. The case was dismissed by the magistrate, with the statement that Dr. Metcalfe should be commended for his work rather than prosecuted or persecuted.

RAISE \$200 FOR SAILORS' FUND AT RECEPTION

WINNHAM, Sept. 20.—One of the largest parties held here for some time was given last night in the armory in aid of the sailors' fund. Receipts were about \$200, including \$50 at the church counter. Music was rendered by the Tony Vita orchestra of London. The hall was attended by many friends, including Clinton, Kincaid, and other near-by towns. In a eucly party for the older members of the club, the ladies' prizes were won by Mrs. W. E. Dyer and Mrs. M. W. Teller of Blyth, the men's prizes by A. E. Smith and M. W. Teller of Blyth.

In connection with the Winham General Hospital a series of visiting hours have been adopted, as follows: Week-days, 2 to 5 p.m., 7 to 9 p.m.; Sundays, 10 a.m. to 12 noon, 2 to 5 p.m., 7 to 9 p.m. In the past no set hours receiving visitors have been in force.

ELECTION PLOT IN 1914 IS PUT UP TO BORDEN BY SAM HUGHES

Doughty Knight Waxes Wroth Over Gossip He Has Overheard.

WILL WASH DIRTY LINEN While Meighen and Premier Must Quit Kicking His Dog Around.

[Special to The Advertiser.] OTTAWA, Sept. 20.—Sir Sam Hughes, ex-minister of militia, in an interview given out here today, tells Sir Robert Borden, Sir Thomas White and others of his cabinet that they were in the administration "where they got off at," when they attacked him, and his record as head of the war department during the first two or three years of the war.

Sir Sam's renewed firing on his old cabinet associates is due to stories he has heard as to alleged recent statements of Sir Robert Borden, Sir Thomas White and others of the cabinet to the effect that it was impossible to control him, and that he sought to be master of the administration and to control, not only the militia, but all the other departments.

Hits Back Hard. Sir Sam, who indulged in some remarks of this kind when in Toronto three weeks ago, consequently the general hits back, and his back hard. Also he intimates that he may hang out more of the Borden Government's dirty linen if they do not stop maligning him and his record.

He charges that instead of "butting into" other departments, he was "butted" by other ministers "butting into" his department, and trying to "but" his department and put through shoddy contracts.

Denies Alleged Statement. Alluding to the statement credited to the head of the Government as quoted above, Sir Sam says: "Permit me to say at the outset that it is devoid of any particle of truth. I have ever recognized the joint responsibility of the cabinet. I have also ever recognized it to be the right and duty of each and every minister to discuss fully in the cabinet the important matters of policy. But while I held it to be my right, I never interfered in any other department, except on the most occasional occasions concerning incidents in my own riding. My policy, and I claim it is the constitutionally correct policy, was that the cabinet should be consulted on matters of policy, and on all important questions, but that on minor matters each minister should consult the prime minister alone, and not bother the cabinet. But what are the facts? While I never interfered in other departments, in another department, some of the ministers of other departments, day in and day out, 'butted' into mine, even in matters of petty detail.

"First—Some of them sought to force me to buy a certain motor truck at nearly one thousand dollars more than its price to ordinary dealers, and at about the same time we could get one of the best trucks on the continent for. After four months' delay in war-time, they brought me a truck which was the firm name of three of the longest German names ever encountered. Another contract was for a company which could not be found by the post office authorities, and the militia officers sent to locate the place could not do so, until a distinguished Toronto statesman interested in the 'naughty' was going to get up a company. Instances of this kind by the score were pressed on me by some few of my colleagues.

"Second—They granted contracts for men's uniforms to ladies' silk underwear makers, and ladies' corset makers, and trust in my leg makers with an English name, whose indicated place of business was on Queen street west, near Osgoode Hall, which place on investigation was found labeled with the firm name of three of the longest German names ever encountered. Another contract was for a company which could not be found by the post office authorities, and the militia officers sent to locate the place could not do so, until a distinguished Toronto statesman interested in the 'naughty' was going to get up a company. Instances of this kind by the score were pressed on me by some few of my colleagues.

"Third—The finance minister not only posed and acted as dictator in his own department, but in 1914, when his policy fully brought Canadian industries hard times, bordering on bankruptcy, he sought to control in detail each and every department. My policy was this: The cabinet meets and each minister presents his estimates. They are, of course, always high. But the total amount available is made known, and the whole cabinet decided, in general terms, what the reduction from the proposed figures should be; in short, what sum should be allotted to each department. Then each minister, in consultation with his own officials, should cut down his estimates in the items which could best spare the amount. The minister would then report to the cabinet. If a further reduction were deemed necessary, the process would be repeated.

Finance Minister's Procedure. "The finance minister's plan, however, after the general reduction had been decided on, to call each minister in turn to his office, and he, assisted by the minister concerned, should apportion the reductions. When the finance minister invited me to go to his office for this purpose, I promptly informed him that the reduction would be apportioned by my own officers and myself, that his function was to raise proper revenue, keep the finances of the country buoyant, and that the ministers of the spending department could be trusted to look after the expenditures.

"After my officers and I had apportioned the reductions, the finance minister came to my office, and I showed him the list of reductions. On that occasion I pointed out to him that he was merely a borrower of money, and a sort of meddling auditor, and not a financier.

"When the war broke out, later on, I illustrated my principle by establishing in Canada the manufacture of shells and munitions generally, iron, zinc, copper, etc., etc., from these have come, despite improvident financing, Canada's good times.

As to Charge of Building. "Fourth—I also am charged, I am assured, with building the whole cabinet. The idea of one man building the cabinet, in preventing an election in October, 1914! The facts are these: When war broke out the question of having a season or an election was discussed. I favored an election at once; that is, before a season, but I found no fault because the majority of my colleagues decided on a season. It will be remembered that the Liberal party, as such, during the short war session, played the game splendidly. It may be suggested, however, it is unfortunate they did not continue their good work. The prime minister, in that session, officially pledged himself and the Government to a non-partisan policy in action. On my return from Gaspé Basin, October, 1914, where the contingents sailed within six weeks after the call to arms was made, I immediately repaired to the prime minister's office, and gave a detailed report of everything that transpired. There were seven people in Canada who had known whence the contingents would sail, and no secret was ever so well kept in the annals of warfare.

Opposes General Election. "I then informed the prime minister that I was going to England to see the boys properly established. To my surprise, he informed me that it had been decided by the cabinet, in my absence, to have a general election, and my opinion was asked. I was so dumfounded that I merely asked: 'How can you, in the face of your pledges to Parliament and the people of Canada?' He further informed me that I was not sailing until the next afternoon, and asked him to await an answer.

Answer was handed in, in a brief memorandum reviewing the situation and concluding with the expression that in view of his pledges to Parliament and the people of Canada that party politics should not be introduced into the election, I could not see how any circumstances, consent to force a general election. There was no threat, there was no bullying. I never spoke to a human soul on the subject until my return from England. Yet I now learn that during the past year this has been trumped up against me as having wrecked the Tory party by building the Government in October, 1914, and preventing a general election."

"Let me here repeat, I did favor, in August, 1914, a general election before a season, but I accepted loyally the decision not to have one. I did oppose, in October, 1914, a general election for the reasons assigned, and as above stated."

Challenges Statements Made. "Hundreds of other instances could be given of meddling on the part of my colleagues, but I challenge any man, from the prime minister down, to show the slightest justification for the statements recently made in Toronto by at least one most distinguished member of the cabinet."

"While a member of the cabinet I played the game loyally in the best interests of human liberty and for the people of Canada. Self did not enter into my actions or conduct. Since leaving the cabinet I have, to the best of my ability, played the game loyally, of two evils choosing the lesser. My course has been directed with the one object of winning this war and establishing human liberty on a solid foundation, not alone in Germany and Austria, but in all the allied countries as well. We must ever guard against the possibility that while overthrowing autocracy in Germany we do not overthrow democracy in Canada."

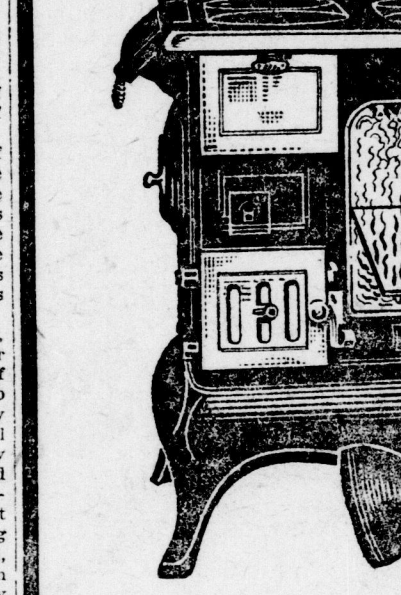
