



SEARGANT PRUDHOMME

Last night Sergeant Prudhomme of the Princess Pats, who will represent Canada in the middleweight boxing contests at the Olympic games in Belgium, left the city to join the rest of the Canuck party sailing from Montreal today.

Sergeant Prudhomme, while not a resident of London, has been sta-tioned here over a year with the Pats company, and may almost be looked on as a resident of the city. He arrived from Kingston Thursday night to pack up, and yesterday was presented with \$300 by the officers and men of the Pats to help defray his expenses to the con-

The boxing team's chances are considered more favorably than any of the Canadian athletic entries, and Prudhomme's work in the trials makes him stand out from the rest. He leaves here with the right to contest in the light-heavy and the middleweight classes. but yesterday in conversation said that he thought he would stay among the middleweights, possibly leaving the heavies to Terscovitch, whom he defeated after a hard

battle in the trials. Sergeant Prudhomme is a quiet, modest youngster, but while he is unobstrusive, he has confidence in his ability. He's very earnest about carry the Maple Leaf to victory overseas, but to add further honor to the Princess Pats. The Pats, whose shoulder badges he will wear through the streets of the old land where they once stood for so much of Empire, need not fear Sergeant Prudhomme adding anything but distinction to them

distinction to them. His boxing experience has not been very wide. During the war, he fought a little around Moose Jaw in battalion matches, and he fought preliminaries in Bramshott and Hasting areas, and also took part in some inter-brigade bouts in France. However, he watched closely, and is a good exponent of the English style of a straight left, as Herscovith found in the trials when he bored in American-wise.

"You will stop off in England?"
