OLIVER IS ASKED ABOUT "YUKON GOLD" CLAIMS

Minister Questioned as to the Bona Fides of the Statements of Tom Lawson's Ads.

OTTAWA, May 4.—(Special.)—Tom Lawson's latest stock venture was the subject of interpellation by Claude Macdonell in the commons this afternoon.

Hon. Frank Oliver stated that the attention of the government had not been called to Lawson's advertisement with respect to placing on the market shares of the Yukon Gold Company, of which Daniel Guggenheim was represented to be president.

The minister stated that many of the claims held by the company have not been surveyed, and as they vary in size, according to the regulations under which they were acquired, the total acreage cannot be computed.

The government had not sufficient information to state whether it was true, as claimed by the company, that it had purchased sufficient creek claims to control the mining situation in that portion of the Yukon Territory.

At present the aim of the commission is to purchase land necessary to redeem the battlefields of the Plains of Abraham and of St. Foy, and not to expropriate such buildings as the post and the Ross Rifle Factory.

Arrangements are about to be made for the systematic collection of subscriptions through Canada, under the supervision of the central committee at Ottawa.

THE PULP PROBLEM. Canada's Superintendent of Forestry is interviewed at Washington.

WASHINGTON, May 2.—(Special.)—R. H. Campbell of Ottawa, Canada, superintendent of forestry of the Canadian Government, is at the Shoreham, in company with Dr. W. F. King, chief astronomer of the Dominion of Canada, and member of the International Waterways Commission. These representatives are in Washington on certain rights where two rivers cross the two countries.

In this instance the two rivers are the St. Mary's and Milk Rivers and matters Mr. Campbell said: "The forestry problem is more or less new to the Canadian Government. We have not advanced as far in these matters as your country has. There are many of our leading men who are beginning to look into these questions, especially as the problem of cheap power is being discussed in the American congress."
