HOPE TO SEE RACING RESUMED IN ENGLAND

London, May 28.—English flat racing has been halted until the premier meets the deputation of the Jockey Club at the end of the month. While it is hoped by all followers of the turf, and expected that a resumption will take place, an interesting table, showing the leading winning owners, trainers and jockeys, has been compiled up to the date of the stoppage of the brief season. Lord D'Alberston claims first place in the owners' list, with winnings of the total value of \$21,000. One Thousand Guineas, Mr. Fairlie comes next, with \$20,000, due to his capturing the two thousand Guineas. The only other owner to get into four figures is Lord Derby, who has made such a fine gain on behalf of the sport, who has won three events, of the total value of \$7,000. Lord Derby's trainer, the Hon. George Lambton, heads the list of trainers, having won five races, worth in all nearly \$30,000. Alex. Taylor is second, his one winner, Gay Crusader, crediting him with \$20,000. Leach is third, with total winnings of \$17,500. Lord D'Alberston and Mr. Fairlie are tied for fourth place in the breeders' table. Lord Derby coming third, while Sir M. Fitzgibbon is fourth, with \$17,500. On the side of the jockeys, the sire of Gay Crusader, are first and second in the riders' list. Dark Ronald comes third, being followed by Spring-ton, Polymus and Pownallpiece. Steve Donoghue retains his position as champion jockey, with nine victories to his credit, though he has only one point advantage over Top. One of the most interesting features of the season has been the return to the saddle of Otto Madden, who won the Derby on Jeddah nineteen years ago. The veteran, who displayed all his old ability, won two races, and only just missed landing the two thousand Guineas by a head.

Award Will Be Contested By Kelly Contracting Firm

Winnipeg, Man., May 28.—Action will be taken in the courts to set aside the award made by Umpire MacDonald, of the appraisal board, in regard to work done by Kelly and Sons on the new capitol buildings. "Numerous reasons will be given the courts for the setting aside of the award, one of these being that the contractors have been unjustly penalized hundreds of thousands of dollars in regard to work done by them on the parliament buildings," says The Winnipeg Telegram today.

Les Darcy Hounded To Death, Declares Referee W. Roche

Poor Les Darcy had to die before the worth of his good points was recognized. When he was in Pittsburgh last winter and gave local exhibitions, Jimmy Dime, who had just returned from Australia, said, pointing towards Darcy: "There is the most popular boy that I have ever seen in years. They love him over there. His mentor, aside from his parents, was not this or that man, but a real boy, who was just a kid his parish priest took a liking to him and taught him and instructed him in the ways of the world, and now you can't find a cleaner boy in the boxing profession than he."

"Darcy was a victim of circumstances," said Roche, "and of a man who seeks publicity, no matter by what means. The crusade against him in the United States was eminently unfair. The boy worried over it until his health gave way under the strain. It was the campaign, not pneumonia, which killed him."

To show the general feeling of respect for Darcy, a touching scene was enacted at the L. V. O. Dime bout in New York. Just before the main bout Joe Humphries asked the ages and gave homage to the memory of Darcy. The house was deathly quiet as the spectators rose as one man, and gave a hushed hearse listened attentively as Humphries said: "I voice your and my own sentiments when I ask from the centre of this ring here tonight that God be good to the memory of that pugilistic martyr, Les Darcy, who died today without ever really having a chance."

Two Men Presumed Drowned in Drag Lake, Haliburton County

Haliburton, May 28.—John T. Laking and Lee Lindsay of Haliburton, are missing since Saturday and presumably drowned, the canoe in which they started up Drag Lake being found capsized yesterday.

Both were well known. The former being the son of Wm. Laking of Hamilton, and the latter a railway mail clerk and a native of Cammington.

SENATE OF ROMANIA SENDS U. S. GREETINGS

M. Thomas, French Minister of Munitions, Arrives at Jassy.

London, May 28.—A despatch to Reuters' Telegram Company from Jassy, the Rumanian capital, says M. Thomas, the French minister of munitions, has arrived there and that M. Kerevsky, the Russian minister of war, is expected in a few days.

On the occasion of the reopening of the Rumanian Parliament the senate sent enthusiastic salutations to the United States Senate on the participation of the United States in the war for the triumph of the principle of nationalities, for which Rumania is struggling side by side with the ante-allied powers.
