

Nightingale Sewing Club Hears Reports of Busy Year

At their last regular weekly meeting the Nightingale Sewing Club heard reports covering its second year's work. Altho the membership is limited, the reports showed that during the year 527 articles had been made for Red Cross purposes, including 188 pairs of socks, 150 shirts, 201 muslin dresses, as well as other smaller articles. The club financed the purchase of material for goods made up, having raised, chiefly by members, contributions of \$305.22. The club's officers are: President, Mrs. W. B. Row; vice-president, Miss M. Crow; secretary, Mrs. William Banks; treasurer, Mrs. R. Lorne Stewart.

Asks for Unstated Damages For Injuries She Received

Before Mr. Justice Latchford in the non-jury sittings court Mrs. Charlotte Ellis, 65 Hocken avenue, is suing the city for unstated damages for injuries alleged to have been sustained when she fell on the icy sidewalk in front of Dr. J. M. Cotton's house, East Bloor street, on January 20, 1916. She stated that she was in a delicate condition at the time and attributed serious results to the fall. Medical testimony differed as to the effect of the fall on her condition, and the city produced evidence to show that ice and snow had been cleared from the sidewalk.

GENEROUS GIVERS FOR BLIND GIRL

Many Contributions Continue to Come in for Marguerite Clarke's Education.

Contributions for the little blind girl, Marguerite Clarke, whose case was taken up by The Toronto World, were an encouraging yesterday, the second day of the appeal, as on the day previous. Not only are the amounts sent in generous, but the spirit of the giving speaks for the tenderness which lives in the hearts of men and women alike where the interests of a child are concerned.

Among the sums that came in was \$5.25. It was brought in by a man who handed the money with a note which said simply, "Baggage men at Union Station." One could imagine these men in the midst of their hard work stopping for a moment to go down into their pockets for the quarter or other coin, and happy in doing it for the sake of the wee blind girl.

ACCIDENTAL DEATH

A verdict of accidental death was returned by the jury at the morgue last night at the inquest on the body of Robert Campbell, a yard foreman in the C. P. R. yards at Parkdale, who was killed by a shunting engine on the afternoon of Jan. 31. Campbell was picking ice out of a switch when he was struck. The jury added a rider to the verdict, stating that more protection should be taken to warn the men who are working under such dangerous conditions.

SALE OF THEATRE

I. R. La France and S. M. Burt Win Suit Against Northern Life Assurance Company.

In the non-jury county court yesterday, Judge Denton awarded I. R. La France and S. M. Burt \$263 and costs in their claim for \$540 commission from the Northern Life Assurance Co. of Canada, on the sale of the Woodbine Theatre and apartments at 1383 East Queen street. They claimed that they found purchasers in J. C. Frair and his solicitor, who eventually obtained the property for \$20,800. The defendants declared that there were no arrangements made for the payment of commission.

LODGE NEWS

BRUNSWICK ORANGE LODGE. Presents Past Master's Jewel and Hears Address on the Orange Order.

At the regular meeting of Brunswick L.O.L. No. 404 in the Orange Hall last evening the past master's jewel was presented to G. Sweet by Bro. R. Burns, past imperial grand master, Triennial Orange Council of the World. In a spirited address on the Orange institution he congratulated Brunswick Lodge on its grand row being overseas, one of whom, Pte. T. E. Olson, having been awarded the military medal.

At a special meeting of the Loyal Dovescourt Lodge, Manchester Unity, I.O.O.F., in the Summerfield Hall, the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Noble grand, J. J. Fox; vice-grand, G. H. Morris; trustees, A. House; treasurer, T. O'Connor; secretary, E. Box. This lodge has now 22 members overseas, of whom ten have made the supreme sacrifice.

CITY HALL NOTES

Acting Mayor O'Neill says that a satisfactory adjustment of the old jail problem is in sight. It is probable that part of the building will be kept open and some of the employees let out.

The board of control yesterday recommended a grant of \$1,000 to the 25th Construction Battalion. Major W. W. Ferguson and Captain Macdonald, who presented the case for the battalion, showed the unit to be \$1,000 in debt to the bank.

In his third report of the year '16, the Commissioner Harris recommended to council that Duplex avenue be extended on the local improvement plan. He suggests that the city pay one-fifth of the cost and the property owners the balance.

Tug Maxie Must Be Paid for As She Was Sounded When Bought

In the action of J. P. McSherry against Maurice Bernard and William Kirvin, carrying on business as the Belle River Fish Co., for \$451, balance of the purchase price of the tug Maxie, which was sold for \$1100, Judge Coatsworth has found for the full claim. The defendants declared that soon after the tug was launched it was at the bottom of the Belle River where it still lies, and alleged misrepresentation.

HAS PROUD RECORD

At last night's meeting of the Lodge Hammersmith, S.O.E.B.S., at the S.O.E. hall, special reference was made to the proud record held by the lodge. Out of a membership of 274, eighty-seven have joined up and sixty-eight are overseas. Eight have made the supreme sacrifice and one has been missing since last June. Last night, twenty letters were read from various members, thanking the lodge for the parcels sent to them at Christmas.

King Solomon Lodge, A. F. and A. M., No. 22, held its regular meeting last evening in the Temple Building, presided over by Wor. Master E. S. Dolson. There were many visitors present, among them being Wor. Bro. J. O'Connor, Wor. Bro. W. H. Stainion and Rt. Wor. Bro. J. W. Clewley.

COLONEL F. W. MARLOW EXPLAINS SITUATION

Issues Statement Urging Full Control by Army Medical Service.

Col. F. W. Marlow, who on Wednesday put in his resignation as director of medical services for Toronto military district, issued a statement yesterday explaining this step. In his statement he says in part: "In view of the many reports which have appeared in the press since the present and now adjourned session of parliament began with respect to the shortcomings of the Medical Services of Canada, one feels justified in stating that there have been conditions imposed upon the medical services which have made it difficult or impossible for it to grow in accordance with requirements.

"The medical service, on account of its humanitarian nature, affords a very large field for all sorts of people to do something to help in the relief of suffering incident to the war.

"It is beyond question a difficult problem to keep all the interested ones working thru the proper channels in which their work would produce the best results.

"Such a state inevitably leads to inordinate waste of energy and material, and does not tend to produce the best results.

"The present urgent need is a comprehensive plan that will meet the whole situation fairly and restore the Army Medical Service of Canada, full and complete control of all problems relating to the medical service."
