## SENATE DISCUSSES MAGDALEN ISLANDS

Ottawa, April 27.—The question of supplies for the fishermen of the Magdalen Islands was brought to the attention of the senate today by Senator McLean of Prince Edward Island. He stated that the supplies for the season's fishing, including 120 gallons of gasoline needed for fishing boats, were aboard the government steamer Sealers now lying at Pictou, with a captain, but no crew.

## St. Henri Shoe Co., Montreal, Suffers Large Loss Thru Fire

Montreal, April 27.—Fire, which broke out at an early hour this morning, destroyed the premises and stock of the St. Henri Shoe Company, valued at \$200,000. Seven families residing over the factory were nearly trapped and were saved by prompt action of the firemen.

## EVEN MONCTON HAS FEVER.

Moncton, N.B., April 27.—The overall movement is gaining momentum in Moncton, particularly among the clerks in the C.N.R. general office. In the freight claim department all the male clerks have signed an agreement pledging themselves to don the overalls on May 1. In one of the city churches Sunday a man appeared in overall garb, and this marked the first drive in this city against the high cost of clothing.

## DUTCH RESPONSIBLE FOR FORMER KAISER

Lloyd George, in Note, Puts It Up Squarely to Netherlands Government.

The Hague, April 27.—Responsibility for the continued residence in Holland of former Emperor William of Germany was placed squarely and exclusively on the Netherlands government in a note sent by Premier Lloyd George of Great Britain on March 24, and published today for the first time in the "orange book," containing documents relating to the demanded extradition of Count Hohenzollern.

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## EIGHT MILLIONS REALIZED AT NEW YORK FUR SALE

New York, April 27.—New York's annual spring fur auction came to a close today with total sales estimated at \$8,000,000. Beaver was the best seller of the day, and not only brought prices ranging from \$8.50 to \$50 each, but showed an advance of sixty per cent. over the corresponding prices at the spring sale here in 1919. Marmot also advanced sixty per cent. over last April, and northern and southwestern raccoon pelts, respectively, were 50 per cent. higher. Raccoon prices began at \$1 and ran up to \$15. Gray fox was 10 per cent. up, the only drop for the day being in Australian fox, which fell off 40 per cent. The next scale scheduled here by the New York fur auction sales corporation will begin on October 13.

Biarritz, France, April 27.—Plans for the erection of a monument in this city to the memory of King Edward VIII. of Great Britain, have been started. Biarritz was one of King Edward's favorite resorts.

## MUST EVACUATE 20-MILE ZONE

Further Demands Made by Japanese on Russian Soviet in Siberia.

Vladivostok, April 27.—An aftermath of the first session of the Russian-Japanese commission for the liquidation of the events of April 4 and 5, when the Japanese took possession of Vladivostok, has been the publication in the newspapers of new demands by the Japanese command on the provisional government, that Russian armed forces, of whatever political party, must evacuate a 30-kilometre zone wherever Japanese troops are stationed in Siberia. These demands were made at the beginning of the session, and it was asked that they be kept secret, but M. Vilenky, the special soviet commissioner, gave them out to the press.

## PASSES WRECKED VESSEL.

Halifax, N.S., April 27.—A wireless message received here tonight from the steamer Laramie stated that she had passed close to the derelict of the iron sailing vessel "Westgate," in latitude 40.42 north, longitude 63.47 west. The vessel was lying on her starboard side and was high out of the water. The masts were gone, but the deck fittings were in good order.

## KING ALFONZO FINED FOR WALKING ON GRASS

Madrid, April 27.—King Alfonso was fined two pesetas yesterday for walking across the grass in the gardens of the Alcázar. Every member of his suite, who followed the king across the greensward, likewise were fined.

## C. M. Hamilton, M.L.A., Gets Saskatchewan Cabinet Post

Regina, Sask., April 27.—Hon. Chas. Dunning, who has held the portfolio of minister of agriculture, railways and provincial treasurer for some time, has resigned as minister of agriculture, being succeeded by Charles M. Hamilton, M.L.A. for Weyburn.

## Searched Vessel at Moville

Belfast, April 27.—A special force of detectives boarded the Anchor Line steamer Columbia on her arrival at Moville today, and minutely inspected the passengers and their passports. It is reported that they were searching for Professor Eamonn de Valera, "president of the Irish republic," whom the authorities suspected was on board.

## HUDSON BAY LINE IS BEING CONTINUED

Minister of Railways Says No Truth in Report of Restricted Service.

Ottawa, April 27.—(By Canadian Press.)—The minister of railways and canals was asked today whether the statement alleged to have been made by some of the opposition which interviewed the government recently with regard to the Hudson Bay Railway was true, viz.: That the road was in such condition that it would not likely be fit for further operation.
