DOUBLE DROWNING

Young Couple Perish by Motor Yacht Collision.

Watertown, N. Y., June 26.—A special from Clayton, N. Y., says: Edward Wells, aged 18, of Round Island, and Miss Lulu Carmichael, of Albany, were drowned in the St. Lawrence about 11 o'clock last night opposite the depot dock here.

In company with William Wells, a brother of one of the victims, and Miss Emma McGraw, aged 25, of Auburn, the young people had just left the dock in a skiff equipped with a half-horse motor for a spin on the river. They had scarcely gotten under way when they were run down by a fast motor boat owned by George Miller, of Clayton, and occupied by himself and George Boynton, of Watertown. The craft is said to have been going at a 25-mile clip and struck the light skiff squarely in the center, cutting it in two, and hurling its occupants into the water.

William Wells succeeded in keeping himself and Miss McGraw afloat until rescued by the motor boat, but his brother Edward and Miss Carmichael went down before their rescue could be effected.

The bodies of the victims were recovered today in 40 feet of water.

MANY KILLED IN A COLLISION

Disaster on the Bombay and Baroda Railway, Near Baroda, India.

Baroda, India, June 26.—In a collision between an express and freight train on the Bombay and Baroda Railway near Baroda today, a number of persons were killed.

It will be impossible to estimate the loss of life until the wreckage has been cleared away.

Four passenger coaches and four mail cars of the express train and four cars of the freight train were burned.

KING AND CZAR

Discuss Measure for Benefit of Jews in Russia.

London, June 26.—The Jewish Chronicle understands that during the recent meeting between King Edward and Emperor Nicholas at Reval, it was intimated that Premier Stolypin was preparing an important measure for the amelioration of the condition of the Jews in Russia.

This measure, it is stated, will be directed towards modifying the laws governing the Jewish Poles.

THANK-OFFERING OF \$1,666,000

Great Contribution Made at St. Paul's at Close of the Pan-Anglican Congress.

London, June 24.—The Pan-Anglican Congress concluded today with a solemn service in the afternoon at St. Paul's Cathedral, at which the bishops presented a thank-offering from the diocese, laying on the altar vouchers for £333,208.

The cathedral was crowded long before the ceremony began, and a large number of persons, who were unable to gain admittance, remained around the outer doors and eventually joined the service at the appointed time.

There was an imposing procession of more than 200 bishops in gorgeous robes and numerous other ecclesiastics in their robes of office.

The procession left the crypt and marched through the streets to enter the great west doors. The choir met the processionists at the doors and headed them up the nave, singing the Litany. The Most Rev. Randall Davidson, Archbishop of Canterbury and primate of All England, preceded by a magnificent primatial cross and followed by a train-bearer and his chaplains, brought up the rear.

The prelates having taken their places in the chancel, the organ and choir led with a familiar hymn of praise, which, taken up by 7,000 voices, flooded the cathedral and the neighboring streets. The Archbishop of Canterbury made a brief statement of the purpose of the ceremony, after which he headed a long line of archbishops and bishops, who laid upon the altar parchment vouchers of contributions. It was an imposing and dignified ceremony, and it was followed by a hymn of thanksgiving, a solemn Te Deum and the benediction.

GAVE HIS LIFE TO SAVE TRAIN

The Self-Sacrificing Heroism of Lawrence Friend, Big Four Brakeman.

Paris, Ill., June 26.—Mangled beneath the wheels of the Knickerbocker Special yesterday, Lawrence Friend, aged 23 years, a brakeman, gave his life in preventing the fast Big Four passenger train from crashing into a row of freight cars head-on and the loss of scores of lives that might have followed the collision.

Friend was working on a freight train which was blocking the line when the passenger came along at 40 miles an hour. The brakeman ran to a switch and turned it just in time to throw the passenger train on a side track, but not quickly enough to avoid being struck down and crushed by the Knickerbocker's engine.

CLIFFORD SIFTON HURT

Thrown From His Horse in Collision With a Wagon.

Ottawa, June 25.—Hon. Clifford Sifton, while cantering along on his horse on a country road near Ottawa, yesterday evening this week, collided in the dark, with a vehicle driven by Mr. W. McGrath, a Gloucestershire farmer.

The impact sent the latter off his seat to the ground, and he was rather badly bruised.

Mr. Sifton was thrown from his horse, but escaped with a few bruises.

Standing on the top rung of a ladder with an extinguisher at a fire in York, Pa., John W. Myers lost his balance, fell 20 feet, and fractured a rib.

A fire blew up the nitro-glycerine mixing plant of the Vigorito Powder Company, at Blakely, Cal., but with plenty of time, every employee escaped.
