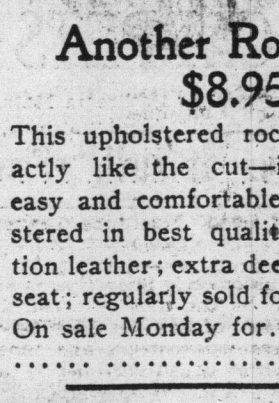

In the Legislature.

Members of the Ontario Legislature in particular, and the public of the province in general, will hereafter please understand that the assembly contains a "privileged person." The member so designated may, however destroy the psychological atmosphere affording him privileged consideration should he make it a habit to disturb the peace and harmony of the legislative family by allowing his zeal to over-leap the limits of parliamentary usage as he did when telling a cabinet minister that if he gave such arguments to an intelligent horse he would be kicked out of the stable, and deserve to be kicked out. It was a credible commentary on the excited member's lapse that the assailed minister smiled benignantly while the leader of the house explained that the

fervid legislator was "a privileged person." Probably the coolest of the forceful speakers in the legislature is W. D. McPherson. This was demonstrated during the budget debate, also on Thursday when the house in committee was becoming entangled over the pure milk question. The junior member for West Toronto towers physically above most of his fellow members. His command of the subject matter of the debate is always denoted by calm dispassionate exposition. When he sat down after his contribution to the budget debate one of the members said to a friend sitting near: "It's a great thing to be able to sit down as cool as you rise to speak." It's a gift, like profanity!" said the friend.

It has been suggested in the corridors that an excellent use might be made by some of the members of party of their extra \$400 indemnity if they were to appropriate a portion of it for a short course in elocution. If the short course in agriculture is illuminating to the rural mind possibly a short course on vocal expression might with advantage be expended by untrained speakers whose other qualities have procured for them nomination and election. Should their time be too valuable to waste attending even a short course elocutionary school, how would it do for them to take a correspondence school course in oratory? Some of the members are born speakers, like R. K. Gurney and A. Grigg for example. Others such as members of the legal profession have had the benefit of the training afforded by their avocation. Unfortunately all the M. L. A.'s are not heaven-born orators, and the cases are rare when the live coal of inspiration has touched the untrained legislative tongue as a result of the mere fact of his being sworn in by the clerk of the assembly.

What the old dandy preacher said of the mundane sphere, "De world do move," is verified by the course of events at the legislature. "Get a move on" has been the slogan sounded by Sir James Whitney since the day a score of years ago of his advent to the chamber. He thundered it out as an opposition member and opposition leader to the jangled administration of the day. Nothing vexed his energetic righteous soul like finding after a belated opening of the session that reports were not ready, business was stagnated by departmental lethargy, and private members' days were practically holidays.

As premier Sir James has steadily applied the pressure of a determined personality, and departmental delays are now unknown. Excellent have been his methods to put vitality into the moribund, and the fruitful results are abundant. One of the "best moves" was ending the fiscal year with the last day in October so that annual reports could be available for a January opening. Thirty-two years of go as you please habits could not be uprooted in a moment, or by a wave of the hand, but they are disappearing. Departmental clerks could be brought under discipline, and whipped up to a faster speed much more readily than legislative committees, but they have been aroused to a sense of their past deficiencies. The traditional idea was that any number of extensions for the time for introducing bills could be secured, provided the interest concerned had a sufficient pull with the government. This session the

record was broken by only one extension of time, and in future sessions the will of Sir James is to be obeyed, and the standing orders committee will not, the chairman promises, even apply for a single extension. A strange discovery has also been made by the members of the committee private bills committee. Afortime visitors at sittings of the committee had the impression forced upon them that the committee members considered it their special function to open loop holes in the general law for favored applicants to push their bills thru. Happily the present body has seen a new and better light, and demands that the promoters of every private measure shall make out a case warranting its adoption not on behalf of applicants' private, but strictly in the public interest.
