FROM A BARREN BEACH TO A CITY OF LARGE BLOCKS.

Nome, an Alaskan Metropolis of Strangely Rapid Growth---\Vhat Has Been Done in Five Years --- Gold the .Agency of It All.

Alfred H. Dunham, chief game warder of Alaska, writing of "The Development of Nome," in the (Yosmopolitan Magazine, says in part:

While Panama, as the site of the great waterway being built to connect the Atlantic and the Pakific, has been attracting so increasingly the interest of the world, there has grown up almost unheralded on the grown up almost unheralded on the system of a civilization destined, there can be no doubt to form the eastern erminus of a tunnel which will connect the railroad systems of the astern and western hemispheres.

The development of Nome has been less rapid absolutely than that of a score of American cities in regions more naturally favored. But viewed in the light of the obstacles of transportation, geographical location and isolation from other centres, Nome's rise in five years from a barren strip of beach fronting a frozen marsh, to a city of twenty-five thousand inhabitants, with banks and schools and theatwes, paved streets and electrically lighted thorough-fares, telegraph Alfred H. caty of twenty-five thousand inhabitants, with banks and schools and theatres, paved streets and electrically lighted thorough-fares, telegraph and telephone systems, and with three separate lines of railroad entering it, stands alone in city building. The growth of Nome and the establishment on Seward Peninsula of a permanent civilization which is not dependent wholly upon the mineral wealth of the soil, has brought suddenly from the realm of dreams to the world of fact and probability the project, long mooted, of all-rail communication between Asia and America by way of Behring Sea. Already Seward Peninsula itself is "gridironed" with railroads built and under construction; a central Alaskan railroad again, this time gasolene engines and


