THE RING. Weinst Disqualified. Buffalo, N. Y., June 27—Charlie Weinst of Newark (N. J.), was disqualified or fouling in the second round of a scheduled ten-round bout with Fred Fulton of Minnesota, here last night. Weinst, repeatedly cautioned by the referee, refused to hit low. The first round had been about even, with both men taking considerable punishment. Fulton weighed 212 pounds, Weinst 190. Hanlon Bests Harry Donahue. New York, June 28—Jimmy Hanlon, Denver, outboxed Harry Donahue, of Erie, in a ten-round boxing bout here last night. Hanlon had four rounds, Donahue three and three were even. MERIT WINS. Enlisted as Private, Now is Major With D. S. O. Case of Arthur O. Blois of Nova Scotia Cited as Evidence of Bardeen Government's Politics—Playing in War. (Halifax Chronicle). Another Halligonian who left his desk to answer the call of duty overseas has won the coveted D. S. O. When war burst on the world in August, 1914, it found Arthur O. Blois occupying a responsible position in the office of a prominent steamship firm in this city. Although a young man, under thirty years of age, the war found Mr. Blois fully prepared. Some years before he joined the 60th P. I. F., as a private, served for some time in the militia department as an officer, and in August, 1914, held a commission of captain in his old regiment. Captain Blois offered his services to his country and his subsequent experiences furnished a concrete instance of how politics or stupidity, perhaps a measure of both, has governed every action of the militia department in connection with the war. Here was a young man fully qualified by long experience in the militia, holding the commissioned rank of captain in an efficient militia regiment, ready and willing to put his life and sword at the service of his country. PROTECTION OF CROPS. Crop protection means crop production. Canada loses over one hundred million dollars worth of her staple crops every year through the depredations of insect pests. A large portion of this loss could be prevented. As we cannot afford to lose the smallest portion of our grain and other food crops during the present critical period when the production of food is of supreme importance, the Dominion Department of Agriculture is making every effort to prevent, so far as possible, losses due to insect pests. Crop protection must go hand in hand with crop production. Insect pests are not usually noticed or reported until they have caused considerable damage. Therefore it is urged that the closest watch be kept on all crops for the first appearance of any insect pests or damage. Immediately such damage is observed steps should be taken to control the outbreak in its incipient stage. If the pest or the method of control is unknown specimens of the insect and its injuries should be sent to the nearest of the following sources of expert assistance: The Agricultural Colleges, the Provincial Departments of Agriculture, or their local District Representatives. The officer in charge of the nearest Dominion Entomological Station, or direct to the Dominion Entomologist, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, for examination; and advice in regard to control measures will be furnished without delay. Letters and packages up to eleven ounces in weight may be mailed to the Dominion Entomologist, "free," but postage will be required on letters or specimens sent to the other sources of advice mentioned. Do not delay reporting insect outbreaks or sending injuries; delay may involve serious losses that could otherwise be prevented. Write immediately, or telegraph if the outbreak is serious. Clean farming, the securing of vigorous growth in young plants and good cultivation are the best protective measures against insect attack. Keep all crops constantly under supervision for the first appearance of any damage in order that it may be checked without delay. Increased crop production involves increased protection against pests. Crop reporters and other collaborators are requested to co-operate with the Dominion entomologist by immediately reporting to him any insect outbreaks in crops in their districts. The co-operation of all in protecting our crops is most earnestly solicited. The Entomological Branch has established a laboratory at Fredericton. It is important that all outbreaks of insects should be reported as soon as noted in order to start control measures before serious damage is done to the crops. All enquiries, correspondence, etc. addressed to the Dominion Entomological Laboratory, Box 845, Fredericton, N. B., will be promptly answered and the best methods to control the various injurious insects will be recommended. A War Catechism. H. G. Wells, in his appeal on behalf of National Service, issued by the National Service Department, gives a list of questions "men and women must ask themselves."
